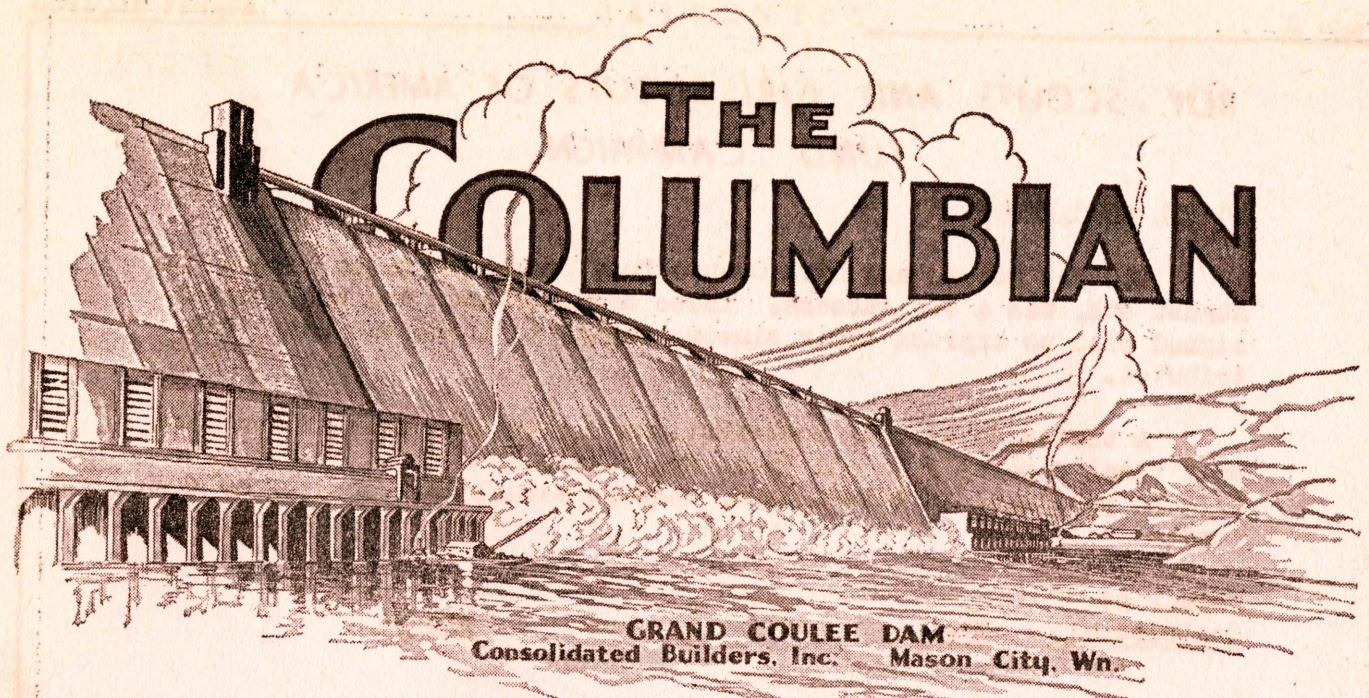

TWELVE BIG CRANES WILL PLACE CONCRETE FOR GRAND COULEE DAM

Optical illusions, originating both with the normal and abnormal eye, have a good chance for free play at Grand Coulee dam. This only tends to excuse the scribe who erred widely by calling concrete buckets only two feet in diameter. That human being, were he called to pass again on sizes, probably would also err widely as to dimensions of concrete-placing equipment atop the construction trestle; but a recent photographer saw new light when he found himself unable to take a close-up of hammerhead cranes. They were too large for the camera eye.

Rising on the construction trestle are double-cantilever (hammerhead) cranes that any writer might misjudge unless advised of engineering calculations; for it is indeed true that to view the cranes either from a distance or from a close point might mean visual distortion.

The child who walks half the length of the building which houses Mason City stores, the post office and the bank also walks the length of booms on Clyde-Wiley whirleys. The man who strolls from the east end of the store on down to the west partition line of the recreation hall has covered the span of the smaller hammerheads. The woman who continues on from the same starting point and sits in a

booth in the coffee shop has traversed the spread of the larger hammerheads.

When crane erection is completed (not later than the early part of October), the bevy of mammoth cranes on the trestle will consist of three of the larger hammerheads, four of the smaller, and two Clyde-Wiley whirleys. Below on the west side three whirleys will be placed atop the transformer deck of the power house section to build up concrete in the walls of the power house and to help with miscellaneous erection. This will mean a total of 12 concrete-placing cranes.

General dimensions of the larger cranes are 356 feet over-all length (more than a city block) and 105½ feet high (approximately 10 stories) with an estimated weight of approximately 275 tons. Work requirements determined the size of the equipment.

The base of the hammerhead arm is 69 feet above the track. This falls only four feet short of clearing the top of the smaller cranes. The operating distance is 330 feet, with trolley travel of 165 feet from the center of the crane. This makes the crane capable of placing concrete anywhere out to 165 feet from the center of the track and at right angles to it. Electric


M STANDS FOR MATCHES


N STANDS FOR NEW

power for the hammerhead is supplied by a motor generator set furnishing current to eight motors totaling 406 horsepower. Truck centers on gantry rails are 50 feet apart.

The smaller hammerheads, which have similar machinery to the larger, have dimensions of 320 feet in length, with a working distance of 300 feet, and are 73 feet high. The arms rest 44 feet above the track. As with all cranes on the trestle, each gantry spans tracks of 43-foot gauge. Truck centers are 36 feet apart. Six motors provide 303 horsepower.

Both the larger and smaller hammerheads are provided with dual controls. Two operators' cabs are to be used, one on each side of the supporting legs or towers of each crane. All hammerheads will be capable of raising empty concrete buckets at 600 feet per minute and of lowering capacity loads at 300 feet per minute. The maximum distance buckets will be lowered from the trestle deck is 245 feet on the vertical. Crane hoists weigh 14 tons each; the drum is 60 inches long and 42 inches in diameter.

The seven double-cantilever cranes were designed by Colby Steel & Engineering company. Bethlehem Steel company furnishes the steel and erects the cranes.

CLYDE-WILEYS

The Clydes weigh 162 tons each. This weight includes the gantry, with a 43-foot span, a 23-foot clearance, and a truss six feet deep to support the whirley cab and boom. The 110-foot boom permits concrete placement or other work at a distance of 115 feet out from the center of the cab in any direction; it operates from 15 degrees below horizontal to 75 degrees above. The boom is of silicon steel, stronger than ordinary steel. It is of the box type, with heavy corner angles and diagonal bracing on all sides and transverse bracing on diaphragms.

Each crane is powered by three electric motors totaling 290 horsepower. It has a lifting capacity of more than 11 tons at flat boom, of more than 40 tons

Club membership is \$1.25. This entitles the member to attend one dance and to retain the card as long as he complies with rules of conduct. Cards will not be issued at the door.

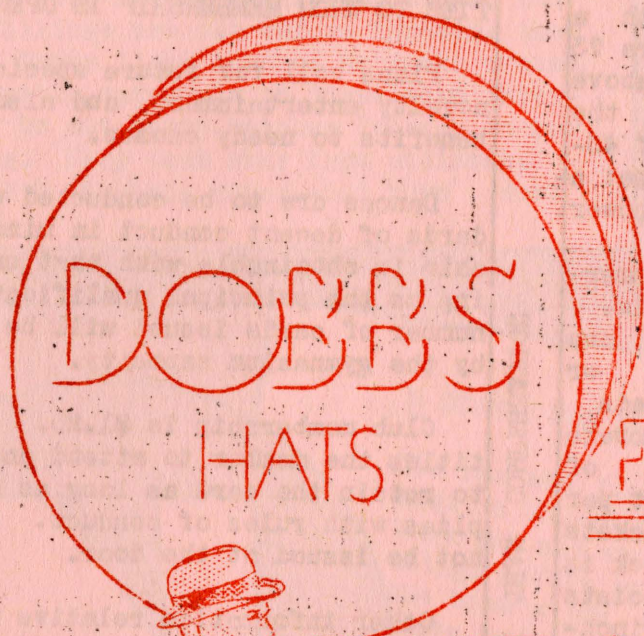

high boom. Operating levers are assembled in a quadrant at the upper right hand corner of the upper frame. The drum which winds and unwinds the cable is relatively large in diameter and of short length to facilitate spooling. The hoist speed is 170 feet per minute.

The particular advantages of the whirleys are their agility and ability to handle all types of materials at any point within the limits of their swing. Hammerheads have a faster hoist operation and a longer reach but can work only at right angles to the track. However, they are somewhat compensated for this because, like the whirleys, they travel on the track. These two types of cranes, by working together, are versatile enough to handle all crane problems in the building of Grand Coulee dam.

ACCIDENT TOLL CAN BE REDUCED

Thousands of people are killed and millions are injured annually throughout the world in the earning of livelihoods.

Within recent years industry turned to making the supervisors of work groups responsible for the safety of their men in an effort to change the direction of the accident toll.

Authority is vested in a foreman to give orders for work to be done. This also gives him the right to make sure that the work is carried on in a safe manner. If work results in serious injury, the man in charge must bear responsibility because he has the authority to insist that every precaution be taken to prevent injury.

It is not necessarily true, as some foremen believe, that workmen know as much about the work as they themselves do. The foreman probably showed added ability and knowledge or he wouldn't have gotten his present position.

His chief problems are to maintain progress--and to keep his employees safe. If he is a good foreman he has balanced temperament and a sincere interest in the safety of his workmen. Too many strive to get the most work done, regardless of anything else. Foremen should remember that many men, however experienced they are, will always need guidance.

SCHOOL BELLS RING SEPTEMBER 6

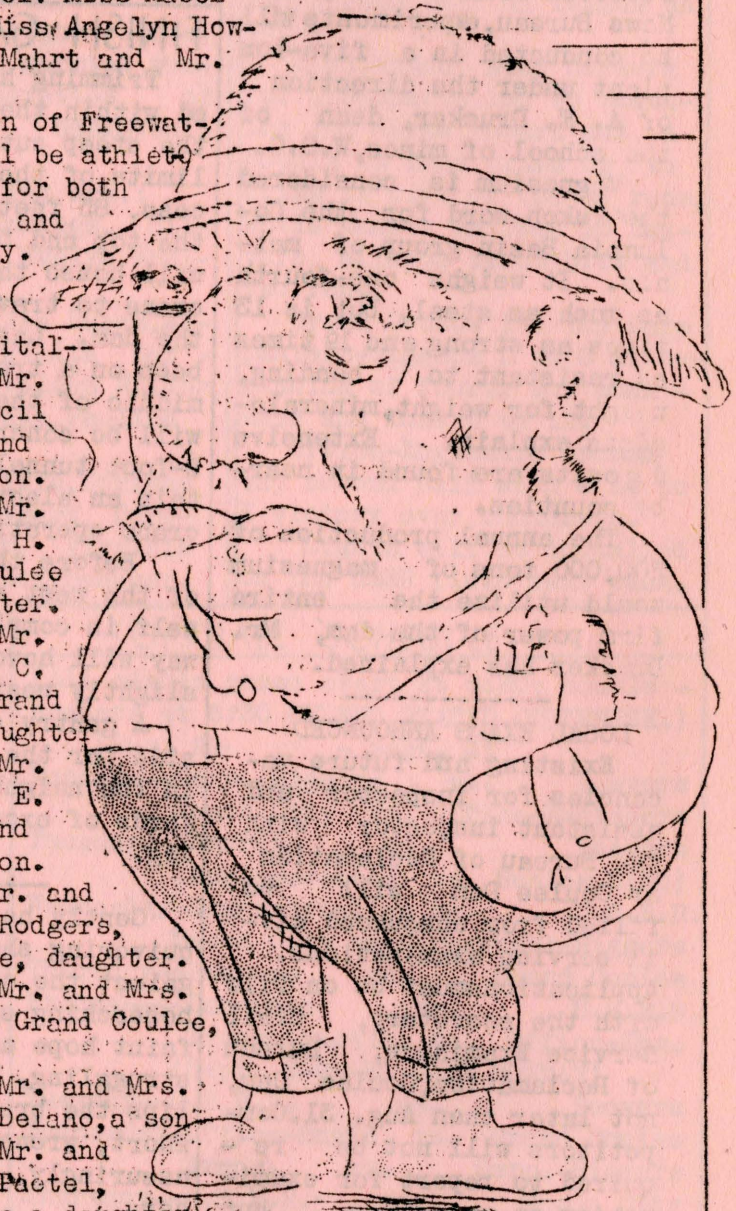

AREA'S "YUKON" GETS ATTENTION

What is considered an important step in the future development of the area affected by Grand Coulee dam are arrangements completed between the bureau of mines and the State College of Washington in the experimental production of magnesium upriver at Chewelah.

According to information received from the Spokane News Bureau, experiments will be conducted in a five-ton plant under the direction of A. E. Drucker, dean of the school of mines, W.S.C.

Magnesium is considered the Yukon word for the Columbia Basin group of metals. It weighs one-fourth as much as steel, but is 13 times as strong and 19 times as resistant to bending, weight for weight, mineralogists explain. Extensive deposits are found in nearby counties.

The annual production of 500,000 tons of magnesium would utilize the entire firm power of the dam, Mr. Drucker has explained.

LOCAL EXAMS ANNOUNCED

Existing and future vacancies for inspector and assistant inspector with the Bureau of Reclamation at Coulee Dam will be filled from announced civil service examinations. Applications must be on file with the secretary, Civil Service Examiners, Bureau of Reclamation, Coulee Dam, not later than Aug. 31. Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated on experience and fitness.

THREE DAYS!

Voters who will be responsible for the election or non-election of office holders have but three days in which to register for the primary elections of Sept. 13. Registration closes Saturday at 8 P.M. Prospective voters, regardless of their political interests, should make it a point to register or check their registration immediately rather than chance becoming ineligible to vote.

Civic-minded people of the area who have attained the age of 21 have five places of registration: (1) Mason City (registration at fire station); (2) Elmerton; (3) Coulee Dam; (4) Grand Coulee (registration at city hall); and (5) Osborne, which includes Delano and Electric City.

FINISH GANTRY CUT

Trimming has been completed within the past week of the steep cut beyond western limits of the dam. The recess, 85 feet into rock at the top and 50 at the bottom, will house the big gantry crane to traverse the top of the dam. Last rock work has been on a trench through the middle of the cut. The trench will be concreted as a 5x-5-foot tunnel and will contain an electric line for crane operation.

Before the entire length of the west side trench itself is completed the highway will have to be moved slightly westward.

A gantry cut on the east side for the same crane has in the neighborhood of 2000 yards of excavation remaining.


