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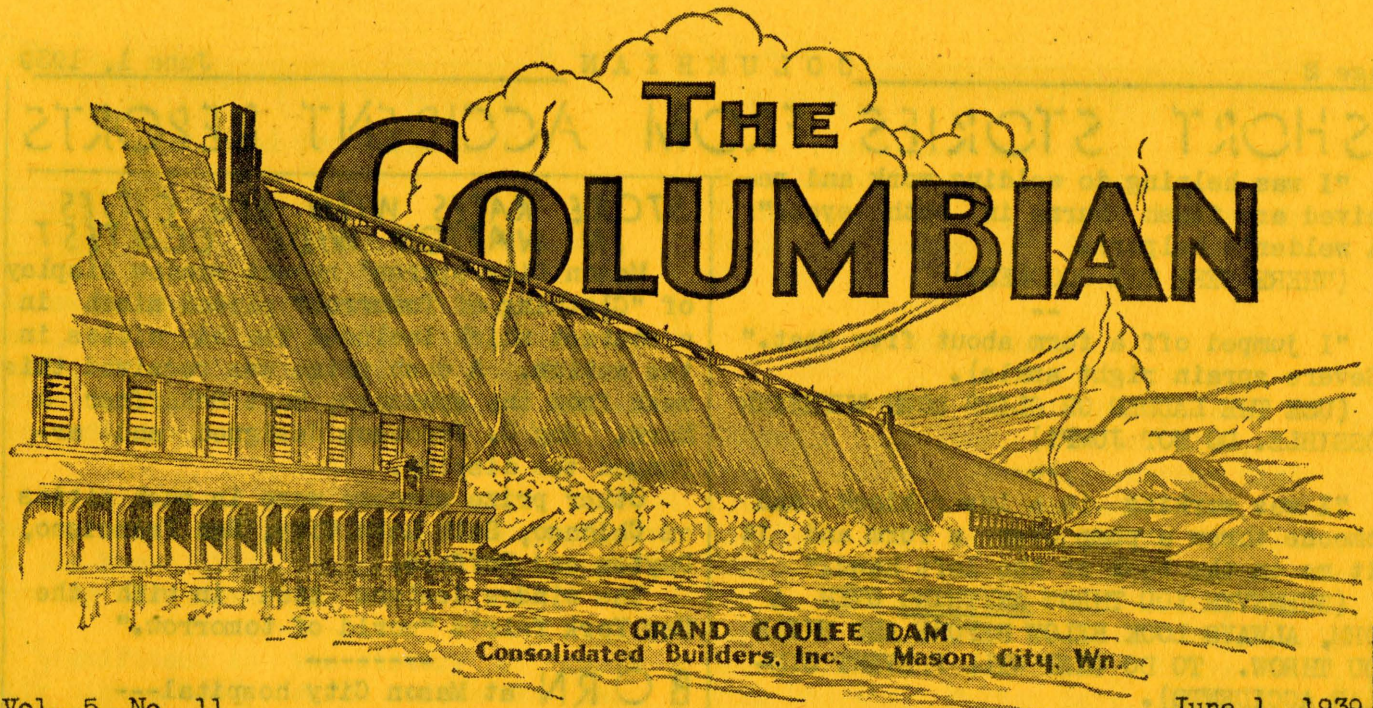

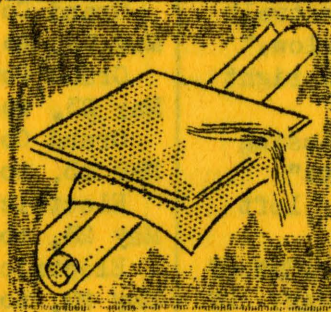
## TWO THOUSAND VOICES—"SCHOOLS OUT!"

A substantial part of the citizenry of the Grand Coulee dam area is taking a vacation--

Two thousand attending the schools of the area will have found their school term ended by tomorrow.

Tonight (Thursday) Mason City high school's largest graduating class (17) will receive diplomas. Last night 46 were graduated from Grand Coulee high school.

As the curtain lowers upon the classes of '39, it signals the termination of the fourth year of an educational development that has received recognition in a state whose educational standards are second to none in the nation. Only four years ago communities hastily erected one-room buildings to get the educational program wedged. These at first could not keep pace with communities which



mushroomed into existence, spread, finally to adopt the semblance of permanent towns. In keeping with the increased population, modernization in communities and the need for the best in educational practice, the schools expanded facilities and programs to conform to recent developments in the field of education.

Four districts with nine schools find representation among damsite communities. These are Grant county district 55 (five schools), Okanogan county district 79 (two schools), Douglas county district 123 (one school) and part of the Nespelem district at Elmerton (one school). District 55 is under the supervision of Supt. W. J. Harmon at Grand Coulee high school. Districts 79 and 123, with separate schools boards, are operated together as the Coulee Dam Public schools under the superintendency of J. W. Stansfield.

Baccalaureate services were held last Sunday with the Rev. D.E. Peterson, pastor of the Mason City Community church, conducting the services.

Significant in the history of Mason City high school, which serves the two communities of Mason City and Coulee Dam, is its acceptance into the Northwest Association of Secondary schools in 1938. This is particularly interesting with recollection of a pioneering-day housing structure which originally was a pipe shop, then a city hall, finally a school building. It was supplanted nearly one year ago by the new air-conditioned high school.

Membership in the association of secondary schools permits high school graduates or transfers to attend any state college or university or public high school in the land without entrance examinations or loss of credits. Ordinarily only large and permanent schools can meet the requirements for membership in thorough and expansive programs and facilities. Mason City high school had a total enrollment of 84 for the past year (190 in the grades).

The Coulee Dam public school system is composed of two districts. On the west (Douglas county) side of the river the Bureau of Reclamation constructed a permanent school building which educates grades from four to eight inclusive. On the east (Okanogan county) side CBI last year built the new primary building, high school and gymnasium. (Cont. on Page 5)

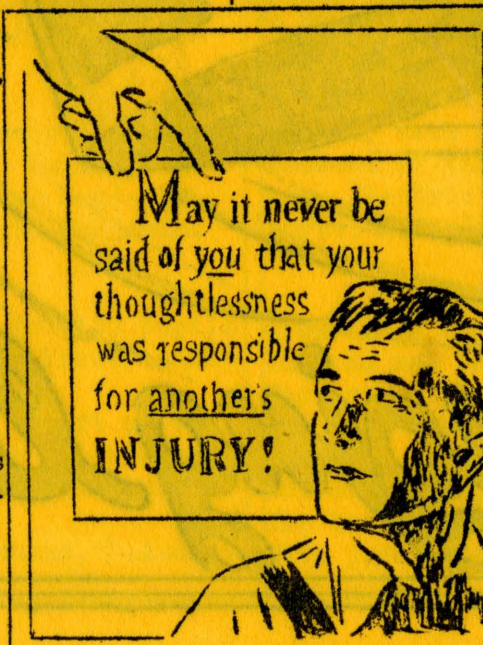

Four years ago, with the clusters of homes increasing daily, the community of Grand Coulee hastily erected a one-room school. This simple and educational pioneer building was soon followed in 1935 by construction of the first unit of eight classrooms for the present Grand Coulee building. The second unit of 23 rooms was added in 1936. Last winter the new gymnasium was built.

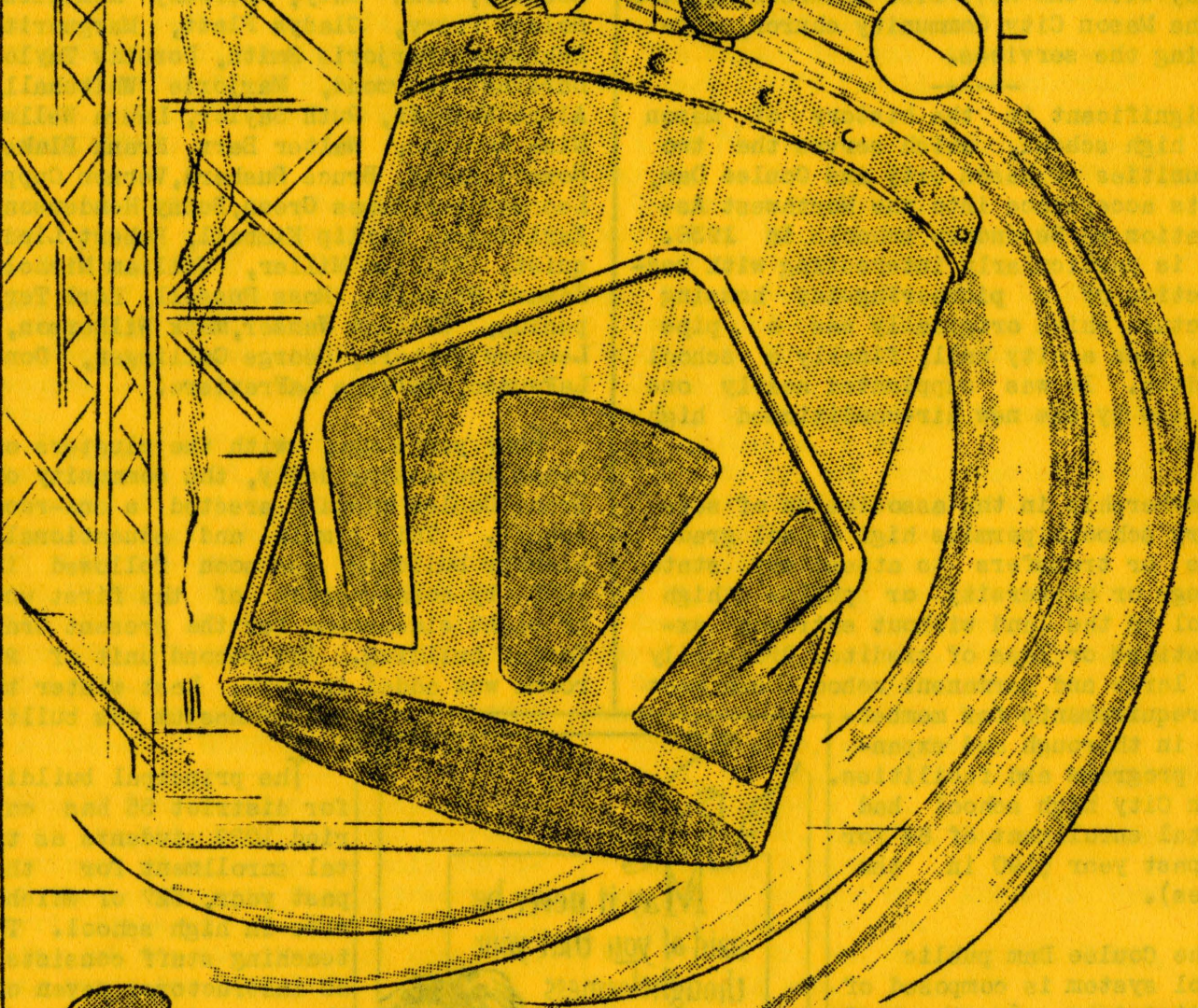


The principal building for district 55 has carried 1029 students as total enrollment for the past year, 327 of which were in high school. The teaching staff consists of 30 instructors; seven of these are in high school. The total enrollment for the entire district has been 1593, an increase of 260 over the previous year.

## MASON CITY HIGH

Construction of the gymnasium a year ago stimulated a wide variety of athletics, together with other high school and civic affairs, including productive results in vocal expression through convenient and adequate stage facilities. Preparations have already been made to give further attention to music, both vocal and instrumental, and to dramatics next fall.

In athletics Mason City high school turned in its most noteworthy season. The basketball team took the Okanogan county title and placed second in the district play-off in which Grand Coulee high took first place. The tennis team met its first defeats in four years when it was nosed out by duplicate scores of 3 to 2 in each of its last two meets with Wenatchee in May. The baseball team has broken even.

The high school faculty consists of Miss Angelyn Howells, Miss Mabel Youngberg, David Mahrt, Gailord Nelson and Mr. Stansfield. The grade school, in order from the first grade: Miss Marie Lenhart, Miss Chloe Dungan, Miss Josie Beyersdorf, Miss Leona Johnson, Miss Gladys Hughes, Lester Inch (sixth and seventh grades) and A. H. Irwin. Miss Ruth Markhus is secretary of the school system.

Three are leaving. Miss Youngberg will be replaced by Miss Helen Kohler of Seattle. Miss Lenhart, to be married, will give place to Miss Lorraine Nylund of Seattle and Miss Hughes' return to school has resulted in the hiring of Mrs. Priscilla Carmichael of Tacoma.

### ELMERTON

## GRAND COULEE HIGH

275 pupils, six teachers; Osborne, grade school with 163 pupils, four teachers; Grand Coulee, first, second and third grades, 93 pupils, two teachers; Delano, first and second grades, 133 pupils, three teachers.

Of unusual interest to the state has been the athletic record of Grand Coulee high school for the past year. With no gymnasium facilities until the season was over, the basketball team took county and district titles and then placed sixth in the state tournament in Seattle. The football squad went unbeaten. In baseball the Tigers took first in northwestern Grant county and placed fourth in the district meet at Wenatchee. Members of the track team participated in the state interscholastic meet at Washington State college last Saturday.

Grand Coulee high school has complete departments for economics, commercial, science and languages and other divisions of study with the exception of mechanical arts and agriculture. Music and dramatics will be further emphasized next fall as a result of gymnasium construction. A 20-piece orchestra has been maintained during the past year with 60 beginners enrolled in music.

The district has never suffered any sickness epidemics. Children are constantly checked by the county health department. Fresh milk is made available at noons and during winter months the Parent-Teacher's association provides hot lunches.

The district is superintended by W.J. Harmon, with H.T. Westphal, principle. Members of the school board are W.L. Palmer, Electric City; A.F. Whetstone, Osborne; E.H. Johnson, Grand Coulee.

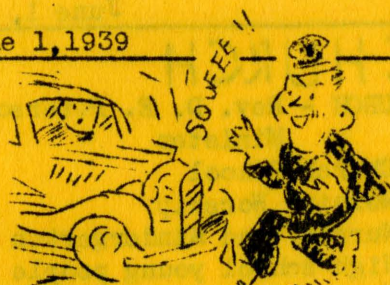

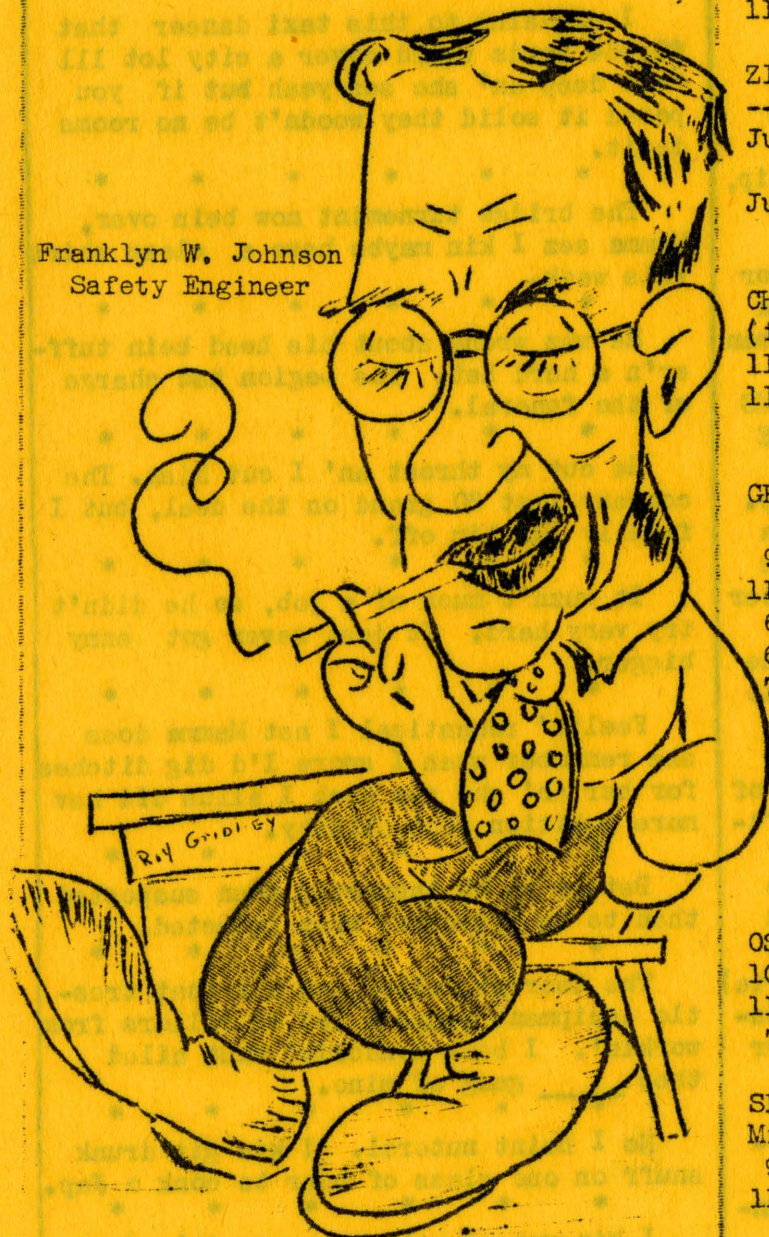

# ATTENTION - ATTENTION

The practice of throwing or shoveling waste material over the upstream face of the dam has reached dangerous proportions the past few days. Men working on the trash racks or using the catwalks between the structures are not protected in any way from this material. Several have received injuries, fortunately not yet of a serious nature, from rocks, pieces of concrete, drain tile and scrap lumber.

If you MUST throw anything over the side, use extreme caution. Be sure that a fellow worker is not directly below!

All travelers over the highway above the west end of the dam are soon to see a change for from 1400-1500 feet of road.

Crews are ready to start to work cutting the grade of the highway from four to six feet.

Drillers are to proceed along the outside half, after which the strip will be paved. Work will then proceed to the inner half. Traffic will be protectively bulkheaded off from the drilling area.

The highway is to be cut to the elevation of the top of the dam.

On completion the section of paved road will be 28 feet from shoulder to shoulder instead of about 20 as now.

Concrete yard No. 2,000,000 is to go into the dam within the next day or two, for CBI.

Grand Coulee dam today reaches 347 feet above the lowest point of bedrock. The maximum point is 153 feet above the downstream elevation of water.

The two guesses of Charlie Osborne in the engineer's Floodstages were both the closest of 93 as far as the present elevation of the river is concerned. His were 965.9 and 968.8.

Closure gates will soon return-- if the river starts its drop.

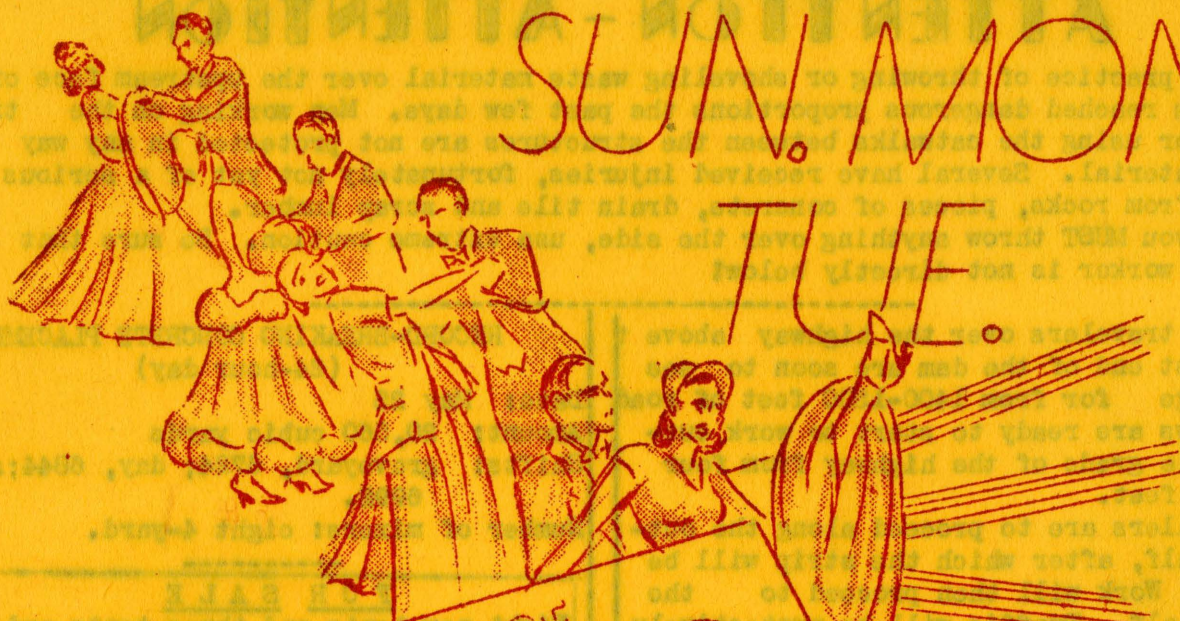
Recent cool and even chilly temperatures down to 50 degrees have been accompanied by a comparatively static elevation of the river.
