MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES
7:30 p.m., Friday, April 14, 1961
Signet Room, Davenport Hotel, Spokane, Washington

The Board of Trustees of Eastern Washington College of Education met for a dinner meeting at six-thirty followed by a business meeting at seven-thirty Friday evening, April 14, 1961, in the Signet Room of the Davenport Hotel, Spokane, with the following present: Mr. Harvey Erickson, chairman; Messrs. Joe M. Smith and Melvin Voorhees, Mesdames Zelma Morrison and Marjorie Tanke, members; Mr. Fred S. Johns, secretary; Dr. Earle K. Stewart, president of the Faculty Organization; Mr. Marion H. Surbeck, Director of Physical Plant; and Dr. Don S. Patterson, President of the College.

#### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting of March 3, 1961, were approved without re-reading.

#### RESOLUTION FROM ALUMNI

Mr. Don Gibbs, president of the EWCE Alumni Association, presented the attached resolution on behalf of the Alumni Association, and Dr. Stewart presented a letter from the Faculty Organization, regarding the salary for the president of the college. The board was in sympathy with the recommendation and stated that consideration would be given to the matter after the joint board meeting in Ellensburg on April 29th.

#### HOUSING AND FOOD CENTER PLANS

Mr. Funk and Mr. Murray of the firm Funk, Murray and Johnson, appeared and presented their revised preliminary plans and is sketches of the new foods center, and Mr. Carroll Martell of the firm of Culler, Gale and Martell, appeared and presented revised preliminary plans and sketches for the men's dormitory. It was moved by Mr. Smith seconded by Mrs. Tanke that the attached resolution be adopted and preliminary plans accepted. Motion carried.

Mr. Johns reported that the Seattle First National Bank had offered to make an interim loan preliminary to construction for these two projects at 3.5% interest.

#### CODE OF ETHICS

Action on the proposed Code of Ethics was postponed until the next meeting of the board since Dr. Lewis, chairman of the committee which drew up the code, was not present.

#### CHANGE ORDERS

No action was taken on the change orders on the science building calling for \$8,024.25 in additional costs. Mr. Smith expressed a desire for written statement from the contractors substantiating figures set forth in the change orders from the architect.

#### CLOSING OF ACCOUNTS

Mrs. Tanke moved that funds left in the Special Construction of 1958 in the amount of \$2, 262.82 be transferred to the Student Union Rental Fund for bond redemption and \$1,056.88 in the special building fund for construction of married student housing be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund for dormitory revenue bonds of 1949 and 1956. Mr. Smith seconded the motion, which carried.

#### RETIREMENT FOR MR. FRASIER

Mr. Voorhees moved that the request of Mr. Clark M. Frasier for retirement at the end of the 1960-61 academic year be granted. Mr. Smith seconded the motion. Motion carried.

The board also approved the extension of employment for one year beyond retirement age for Miss Hope Cullen, campus school librarian.

#### NEW APPOINTMENTS

Mr. Smith moved, seconded by Mr. Voorhees, that the following appointments be approved: Motion carried.

Dr. Glen Kirchner, Sutton Hall director for the summer of 1961 at \$210 plus apartment for the seven weeks term, or \$270 if used for the full nine weeks.

Howard D. Noel, as janitor at \$225 per month as of April 1, 1961, under the emergency employment policies and subject to the Civil Service Statute when activated.

Paul Helsing, as instructor in economics, at \$5600 for the academic year 1961-62.

#### SUMMER SCHOOL VISITING STAFF

The board approved the appointment and salaries of the visiting staff for the 1961 summer school as shown on the attached list.

#### LEAVES OF ABSENCE

Mr. Voorhees moved that the following leaves of absence be granted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Smith and carried.

Thomas Bonsor, assistant professor of economics, for 1961-62 academic year in order to continue graduate study

Leonard Kalal, assistant professor of physics, for 1961-62 academic year to complete doctorate

Don T. Williams, assistant in student personnel services, for 1961 summer and 1961-62 academic year, to continue graduate study at Stanford University.

Don K. Smith, assistant professor of music, for April 11, 12 and 13, without pay, in order to be accompanist for the Scotch baritone, Niven Miller, in concerts in Montana and Canada, and appointment of Mrs. Patricia Smith as substitute for same period under same arrangement as during the winter quarter.

#### TRAVEL

#### The board approved the following travel as indicated:

Karl Morrison, associate professor of art, approved at last meeting for \$145 toward transportation, to attend National Art Education Association Conference, Miami Beach, Florida, April 8-10, to increase amount to be allowed for travel and per diem to \$395

Fred Heinemann, Student Union manager, to attend annual conference of Association of College Unions, Colorado Springs, April 15-21, travel and per diem, approved by Student Union Board, approximately \$218.77.

#### RESIGNATIONS

The board accepted the following resignations

Lee A. Morgan, custodian, as of March 31, plus six days of accrued vacation

Allen J. McCombs, landscape gardener, withdrew acceptance of appointment

Marian Freer, circulation librarian, as of May 12

#### CONVERSTION OF MONROE HALL

Upon the recommendation of Dr. Patterson, the board authorized that Monroe Hall be converted back to the use of women students in order to alleviate the shortage of housing facilities for women, since men students can find housing in Cheney homes more readily than can women.

#### STUDENT LOAN FUND

The board approved the use of local cash funds to match the first four federal payments, thereby releasing \$11,988.33 advanced from the regular student loan fund.

The board also approved the application from the college for additional National Defense Student Loan Funds for the 1961-62 fiscal year in the amount of \$100, 170.00, to be matched by the college with \$11, 130 from local cash funds.

#### REPORT FROM COMMITTEE OF NINE

Dr. Earle Stewart reported to the board on the meeting of the Committee of Nine held in Seattle on April third.

#### INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

Dr. Patterson reported on a letter from Housing and Home Finance Agency, copy of which is attached.

Mr. Johns reported that burglary insurance had been renewed for a three-year period with \$4000 coverage, and extra coverage of \$21,000 on registration days.

Dr. Patterson discussed briefly the auditor's reports which were received this week.

Mr. Johns reported that revenue of \$512.09 had resulted from investment of \$40, 487.91 in U. S. Treasury bills in March, and a total of \$3, 109.17 in revenue from investments since the program of investment of surplus funds was resumed last November.

#### DESIGNATION OF BOARD MEMBER TO CONFER DEGREES

Mr. Harvey Erickson was designated as the board member to confer the degrees at the June Commencement.

#### DATE OF JOINT BOARD MEETING

Dr. Patterson notified the board that the spring meeting of the joint board would be held at Ellensburg on April 29th.

#### AMS DINNER

Dr. Patterson extended an invitation to the board members on behalf of the Associated Men Students to attend a dinner at the Ridpath Hotel on the evening of April 18.

#### DATE OF NEXT BOARD MEETING

The date of Monday, May first, a dinner meeting, was set as the time for the next meeting of the Board of Trustees.

#### ADJOURNED

The meeting of the board was declared adjourned at 10:00 p.m.
