MINUTES OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING 7:30 p.m., Friday, March 9, 1962 Empire Room, Davenport Spokane

The meeting was called to order by the chairman, Mr. Harvey Erickson, at 7:30 p.m., Friday, March 9, 1962, in the Empire Room of the Davenport Hotel, Spokane, with the following present: Messrs. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION

Mr. Voorhees moved, seconded by Mr. Erickson, that the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas, on February 19, 1962, there was made public a joint statement signed by the student body presidents of the University of Washington, Washington State University, Eastern Washington State College, Central Washington State College, and Western Washington State College. The statement called attention to what it described as a climate of opinion in this state which has a negative effect on academic freedoms, and the statement said "We believe it is the inviolable right and duty of institutions of higher learning to serve the educational objectives of their students in the most complete manner," and to hear and "carefully to scrutinize" all views and opinion, and

Whe reas, the statement continued, "We regret that limits on freedom of expression have been set by certain groups outside the college community and that the fear of withdrawal of funds has made some colleges submit to these forces. Our generation will someday assume the responsibilities of national leadership. If we are to fulfill this obligation and preserve the American way of life, we must be able to intelligently differentiate between political alternatives. In order to choose objectively tomorrow, we must be allowed and encouraged to study the choices of today."

Now, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Eastern Washington State College wholly endorses and subscribes to the thesis of this statement from elected undergraduate representatives, and urges that the people of this state ponder the causes and implications of this considered student protest and plea.

After discussion the resolution was adopted. The chairman instructed Dr. Patterson to place the matter on the agenda for the next meeting of the joint board of trustees and to notify the presidents of the five student bodies of the board's action.

CHANGE ORDER

The motion was made by Mr. Voorhees that the change order for installation of phones in offices to be used by the Division of Languages and Literature in the new science building be approved in the amount of \$543.00. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Tanke and carried.

TUITION AND FEES FOR 1962-63

Mr. Johns reviewed the current enrollment fee schedule and the projected increase for 1962-63. He pointed out that the biennial budget had been projected on the basis of \$70.00 per quarter fees for next year, or \$210 for the academic year, and that the statutory maximum is \$230 per academic year.

Dr. Patterson recommended that fees for the 1962-63 academic year be set at \$73.00 per quarter (\$219 per year) with the additional \$3.00 per quarter to be set aside in a special 1962 building fee account. This account would be used to accumulate cash to apply against the financing of student housing and dining facilities.

It was moved by Mrs. Tanke, seconded by Mr. Voorhees that the increase in fees to \$73.00 per quarter be approved. Motion carried.

WRITING OF HISTORY OF COLLEGE

It was moved by Mr. Voorhees, seconded by Mrs. Tanke, that Miss Cecil Dryden, Associate Professor Emeritus of History, be appointed to develop a history of the college as a part of the observance of the 75th anniversary of the establishment of the college, the college to pay costs accruing to Miss Dryden as a result of her work. Motion carried.

ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW FUNDS

Mrs. Tanke moved that the establishment of the accounts attached be authorized and that in accordance with the Loan Agreement these funds be established with the Cheney Branch of the Seattle First National Bank. Mr. Voorhees seconded the motion, which carried.

PEACE CORPS PROJECT

Dr. Patterson reported that Gonzaga, Whitworth and Eastern are cooperating in trying to further a Peace Corps project in a Central or South American country. The total budget is set at \$1500, of which Eastern's share would be \$500. He recommended that the board authorize the expenditure of \$500 to facilitate the service project. Mr. Voorhees asked if the inspiration for this project came from the Federal Government. Dr. Kabat said that it came from students and faculties of the three institutions and that such a project could provide valuable broadening experience for our faculty. He also said that no additional expense beyond the \$500 is foreseen. It was moved by Mr. Voorhees, seconded by Mrs. Tanke, that Dr. Patterson's recommendation be accepted. Motion carried.

APPOINTMENT OF APPRAISERS

In accordance with the authorization of the Board of Trustees at the October 27, 1961, meeting, it was recommended that Mr. L. W. Ditlevson, licensed appraiser, and Mr. W. Edward Betz, manager, Cheney Branch, Seattle First National Bank, Cheney, be appointed appraisers of the land north of Louise Anderson Hall and the remaining parcels of land in the capital budget. Mrs. Tanke moved, seconded by Mr. Voorhees, that these two appraisers be appointed. Motion carried.

GOVERNOR'S DIRECTIVE ON PROPOSED PLANNING

Mr. Voorhees referred to a directive send by the Governor to all department heads directly under the Governor's control. The Governor requested that these departments submit any plans for proposed buildings to the State Art Commission for any suggestions that the Commission might have as to the esthetic aspects of the building. Mr. Voorhees suggested that it might be a good idea for the college to follow this procedure and he requested that copies of the Governor's directive be furnished to the board members with copies of these minutes. (Copy attached)

RESULTS OF GPA

Mr. Voorhees commented on the report presented to the board at the last meeting concerning the prediction of a 2.5 GPA as a requirement for retention in college. He noted that the report stated that if a 2.5 GPA retention standard had been in effect this year, over 50% of the upper classmen would have been dropped from college. He observed that this statement assumed that the students would not have responded to the stimulus for better work. Mr. Voorhees said that he felt the students would respond to such a stimulus.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

Dr. Patterson informed the board that we have received HHFA approval of the requested loan increase of \$162,000, and of the amended budget for the dormitory reflecting the awarded contracts. (Copy of Amendatory Agreement attached). He said we will need to make a similar arrangement for the dining hall when we learn the costs of that project.

Dr. Patterson presented the attached report of the income from basketball for this season.

Dr. Patterson gave a report from Mr. Johns on the purchase of treasury bonds which will produce a revenue for the year from date of purchase of \$3, 306.65. He also stated that total revenue from treasury bill investments for this current fiscal year will be \$5,792.54.

Dr. Patterson reported to the board that Mr. Victor Wulff, an architect from Spokane, had asked to appear before the board. The chairman suggested that, since we have no immediate project, Mr. Wulff be invited to appear before the board at some suitable time next summer or fall. The chairman stated that he feels the college should have an architectural consultant on a retained basis.

ADJOURNED

The meeting adjourned at 9:15 p.m., with the date of the next meeting of the board set for ten-thirty the morning of April 13 in Ellensburg.

AMENDATORY LOAN AGREEMENT

THIS AMENDATORY LOAN AGREEMENT, dated as of March 1, 1962, by and between Eastern Washington State College, a public educational institution of higher learning, located at Cheney, Washington (herein called the Borrower') and the United States of America (herein called the 'Government'), WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Government has approved the request of the Borrower that the amount of the roan contemplated by the Loan Agreement dated as of July 1, 1961, between the Government and the Borrower, be increased from \$2,900,000 to \$3,062,000 to provide, with other available funds, for the increased cost of the Project;

MOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual benefits flowing to the Government and the Borrower, the aforesaid Loan Agreement dated as of July 1, 1901, is hereby amended as follows:

- I. Delete the name 'Eastern Washington College of Education' wherever it appears throughout the Loan Agreement and insert in lieu thereof "Eastern Washington State College.
- 2. In Section 1, delete the figure '\$2,900,000' wherever it appears and insert in lieu thereof '\$3,062,000."
- 3. In Section 2 delete subsections (c), (g), (ii) and (l) and insert in lieu thereof the following:
 - (c) Principal Amount: \$3,062,000
- '(g) Maturities: October 1, in years and amounts as follows:

"(1) Redemption Provisions: Bonds numbered 1 through 360 inclusive, maturing October 1, 1964 through October 1, 1971 inclusive, to be non-callable. Bonds numbered 361 through 2,395 inclusive, maturing October 1, 1972 through October 1, 1996 inclusive, to be callable at the option of the Borrower prior to the stated maturities thereof, in whole of in part and in inverse numerical order on any interest payment date after October 1, 1971 upon at least thirty (30) days prior notice at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption and a premium for each bond as follows:

3% if redeemed April 1, 1972 through October 1, 1976, inclusive 2-1 2% " " 1977 " " 1901 " 1901 " 1902 " " 1906 " 1906 " 1907 " " 1907 " " 1909 " 190

Bonds numbered 2,396 through 3,062 inclusive maturing October 1, 1997 through October 1, 2001 inclusive, to be callable at the option of the Borrower in whole or in part and in inverse numerical order on any interest payment date during the entire life of the loan, upon at least thirty (30) days' prior notice, at par plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

Priority as to call shall extend to bonds numbered 2,396 through 3,062 inclusive over bonds numbered 361 through 2,395 inclusive!

4. In Section 6, Special Condition (c) is amended by deleting all thereof and substituting therefor the following:

'The Borrower shall establish with the Trustee to be designated in the Bond Resolution, and maintain so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding, a separate account or accounts (here in collectively called the "Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account") into which shall be deposited all accrued interest received from the sale of the Bonds; which sum shall be credited against the amount to be deposited into the Account on the next interest payment date. Thereafter, on or before each March 15 and September 15 prior to March 15, 1964, the Borrower shall deposit in the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account sufficient monies from the pledged sources to pay the interest on the outstanding Bonds as the same becomes due by (1) prior to the time any portion of the Project dining hall becomes revenue producing, the direct deposit of pledged Student Building Fee proceeds and (2) as soon as any portion of the Project dining hall becomes revenue producing, transfer from the Revenue Fund Account of the balance therein, after providing for the payment of Current Expenses, plus the direct deposit of pledged Student Building Fee proceeds to the extent necessary to make such deposit. Provided, however, that beginning March 15, 1964, and thereafter the Borrower shall, after providing for the payment of Current Expenses, transfer from the Revenue Fund Account the balance therein and from pledged Student Building Fees such sums as may be

necessary, when added to the Revenue Fund Account balance so transferred, to permit a deposit into the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account in the sum of \$55,200. Such sum shall be deposited to the credit of the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account on or before each Harch 15 and September 15, until the funds and/or investments therein are sufficient to meet the interest on the outstanding Bonds due on the next interest payment date and one-half of the principal due within the succeeding twelve months, plus a debt service reserve in the sum of \$298,300. Thereafter, on or before each March 15 and September 15 the Borrower shall transfer from said sources such sums as may be necessary to meet the interest on the Bonds due on the next interest payment date and one-half of the principal due within the succeeding twelve months and maintain the debt service reserve in the sum of \$298,800."

5. In Section 6, Special Condition (d) is amended by substituting \$293,300% for \$283,000% in the nineteenth line thereof.

THIS AMENDATORY LOAN AGREEMENT shall become effective as of the date hereof, and all of the provisions of the original Loan Agreement, except as hereby amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, this Amendatory Loan Agreement has been executed in the name and on behalf of the United States of America, Housing and Home Finance Administrator, by the undersigned Director for Northwest Operations, and in the name of and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Washington State College, by the undersigned Chairman of said Board, and under its official seal; attested by its Secretary.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Eastern Mashington State College, Cheney, Mashington, has heretofore approved and executed a Loan Agreement dated as of July 1, 4961, with the United States of America, acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Administrator, for a loan in the amount of \$2,900,000 to provide a dining hall (Unit A) seating approximately 1,176 students; a dormitory (Unit B) for approximately 400 men students, a director and two guests; all with necessary appurtenances; at Eastern-Washington State College, Cheney, Mashington (CH-Wash-42(DS)); and

EASTERN WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE Cheney, Washington

COMMENTS:

A Loan Agreement dated as of July 1, 1961, covering a loan of \$2,900,000 and providing for construction of the Project by Units thereof has been fully executed. Construction bids, opened for Unit B on December 28, 1961, and for Unit A on January 4, 1962, overran available funds in each instance. In a meeting with the Applicant's President and Business Manager on January 8, 1962, the total cost was revised to \$3,335,000 and the total loan amount to \$3,165,000 with Applicant to provide \$170,000 in the expectation that, subject to Board action, contracts would be awarded for both Project Units. Subsequently, the Applicant's Board elected to award contracts for Unit B, providing \$16,804 participation to cover ineligible items, and requested the Architect to investigate possible economies on the plans for Unit A for re-bidding at a later date. The Applicant has reserved but not committed approximately \$150,000 for participation to the extent necessary in the cost of Unit A when the new bids are opened.

To reflect the foregoing circumstances and to adjust the estimate of pledged Student Building Fee proceeds to the amount anticipated in 1963-64, the year the Project facilities will be first used, the Project Summary approved July 3, 1961, is revised as follows:

BRIEF PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

As Approved: A dining hall seating approximately 1,176 students (Unit A); a dormitory for approximately 440 men students, a director and 2 guests (Unit B); necessary appurtenances.

Music fees have not been included in the above list. I would concur with the recommendation made by Dr. Lotzenhiser to you dated January 16, 1962 that these fees be removed. Revenue from all Music Fees last year was \$3,875. The revenue loss caused by the removal of these fees will be relatively minor in relation to the total college budget.

We have discussed on several occasions the possibility of increasing the fees next year to \$75 per quarter in order to accumulate dormitory building funds in advance. The \$5 increase over the amount already Dr. Patterson Page 2 March 5, 1962

projected would bring in about \$42,000 per year. If this is to be done the above schedule would be ammended by increasing the incidental fee to \$39.50 with the additional fee being distributed to a 1962 Building Fee Account.

SUBJECT: Retention Standards at EMSC: A Summary of Research Analyses Since the September 29, 1961 Board of Trustees Meeting.

For the September 29, 1961 Board of Trustees Meeting a synthesis of several studies, relating to possible effects of proposed higher standards, was submitted in memo form for distribution to the Board Members. Specifically, the "possible effects of proposed higher standards" concerned the August 1961 proposed resolution which read:

BE IT PROPOSED THAT:

"Effective And Beginning With The Fall Quarter 1961, All Sophomores Shall Be Required To Maintain A Cumulative Grade Point Average Of No Less Than 2.50, And Freshmen Students Shall Be Required to Achieve No Less Than The New Average (2.50) By The End Of Their Third Quarter Of Study, Maintaining Such Cumulative Average Throughout Their Stay In College Thereafter."

The previous memo, dated September 21, 1961, presented certain findings and conclusions. In brief summary, those findings had been:

- 1. That EWSC's standards were comparatively stiff at the present time,
- 2. That the 1.75, 2.00, and 2.25 standards for probation, good standings, and upper-division major respectively appear to be doing the intended job in retention for EWSC at the present time, and
- 3. That Dr. Maier's analyses clearly show that our freshmen often do make a "shaky" start, but one way or another, they go on to earn averages in the range of 2.25 to 2.75 beginning their sophomore year. This finding, of course, applied only to those who survived and/or stayed with us at EWSC."

Other Findings of the September 1961 report included:

- (a) If the 2.50 retention index had been put into effect beginning Fall Quarter 1961, over 50% of the returning sophomores, juniors, and seniors would have been placed on probation or dismissed
- (b) of 76 colleges/universities (this figure was later expanded to llh institutions) surveyed across the United States, NONE were requiring any standard higher than "C" or 2.00 for continued good standing.

Research Since September 1961

I. At E.SC, 694 new freshmen entered in the Fall Quarter 1961. A file card was prepared for each. For the 694, the average high school grade point average had been 2.56 at the time of admissions. However, their first earned average GPA for the Fall Quarter at EMSC was 2.21. Forty-two percent (291 freshmen) earned less than a 2.00 GPA. Sixty-one percent (423 freshmen) made less than a 2.50 standard. The middle 2/3 of the total new freshmen earned GPA's which fell between a 1.40 and 3.02 range.

II. We then took a close look at all 2,265 individual GPA's earned by the total full-time student body during the past Fall Quarter. The average GPA for the total student body was 2.44 precisely. Thirty percent (679 students) earned less than a 2.00 average. Fifty-one percent (1,152 students) achieved less than the proposed 2.50 standard. The middle 2/3 of the entire student body earned GPA's which fell between a 1.72 and 3.16 range.

In terms of "grade-getting" ability, a formula for determining statistical significance showed that the new freshmen were distinctly slower when compared with the sophomores. (Seventeen percent of the 1,22 sophomores earned less than 2,00 GPA. Forty-nine percent of the sophomores made less than the proposed 2,50 standard.) The total sophomores average was 2,51.

III. Using the high school grade-point average as a single predictor, regression/prediction formulae were used to construct a partial table of first-quarter college GPA expectancies. (SEE TABLE VEXT PAGE)

The GPA expectancies are local ENSC norms and may be regarded as being "50/50" chance probabilities, with some freshmen earning higher and some lower averages within the probable ranges.

The table of expectancies would suggest that an average standard of 2.34 in high school might be a necessary minimum for freshmen to have "50/50" chances of earning 2.00 as first-quarter students.

With respect to the proposed 2.50 standard, another glance at the table would suggest that a 2.84 earned high school average might be the standard needed for freshmen to have an even chance to earn 2.50 as first-quarter students at EMSC.

Two more items are worth reporting here. First, a review of the past several years EWSC grading curves, i.e., the number of A's, B's, C's, etc., shows that grading practices tend to be rather stable. Also, the available grading research done at other colleges across the land came to the same conclusion. (The Jan. 22, 1962

Inter-College Bulletin made latest reference). Second, the published research studies by Eells, and Hollis, Fletcher, Peters, Herman, Iffert, Knoell and McCabe, plus the six-year investigation at the University of Utah—all show that to raise retention standards without more selective admissions standards would be rather meaningless.

Of interest here perhaps, we note that WWSC at Bellingham inserted, in their first "Newsletter" (January 1962), a statement that beginning Fall Quarter 1962, a "Multi-Factor Admission Policy" will be applied to freshmen applicants; the bases will be: (a) A 2.50 earned high school record or (b) Graduation in the upper 1/2 of their H.S. class or (c) Satisfactory aptitude test scores or (d) For mature (21 yrs. age up) persons.

Some Discussion Pro and Con

One of EMSC's expressed obligations is "the offering of junior college opportunities," as it is stated in the catalogue. (The offerings are really not "junior college courses" but are, instead, part and parcel of the regular curricula for degree programs.) The prevailing custom and philosophy would be consistent to say it would be undemocratic to deny admission to anyone. Among others, perhaps, popular lay journals such as Saturday Evening Post a few months ago devoted an article to something heard many times———that "it is not fatal to flunk out of college." Some sort of growth would occur despite the ultimate dismissal or withdrawal.

On the other hand, some ask if it is wise to expose academically "high-risk" students to a painful exercise which may end in a personal humiliation. In sustaining the conventional college curricular offerings, must everyone concerned refuse to admit that some high school graduates might not profit from a temporary stay on campus? What is best for the individual? To what extent can or should a college seek to offer courses and programs aside from the degree programs? If the "other-than-degree" studies are promoted, should the usual grade-point admission/retention standards be applied to all students alike?

At the present time, there are two keenly-interested EWSC staff committees which are seeking answers to questions such as those mentioned above. One is the Faculty Curriculum Committee (Chaired by Prof. Hagelin.) The second is the College Committee (ad hoc) For Structural Organization, presently chaired by Prof. Drummond. Quite recently, the members have been raising such long-range questions as:

- 1. What should be the roles of our College twenty years from now?
- 2. Should the College focus its attention on doing a few things well, or should the College attempt to broaden its offerings in all fields?

The evidence available thus far is clear on three points:

- 1. EMSC's retention standards are indeed comparatively tough at the present time. In saying "present time", we note that lilly other colleges and universities (some much larger) have either identical or lower retention standards.
- 2. The trend across the land appears to be toward more selective admissions to reduce the high casualty rate. Academic drop-outs and dismissals at EWSC are already quite high; similar losses are recorded for many other institutions.
- 3. Of those freshmen who survive, one way or another, the sophomore year finds them regaining their balance enough to earn 2.50 as a class group. At least that was the case for the 422 full-time sophomores during last Fall Quarter.

Attached are recommendations for appointments and salary, as indicated, for the 1962 summer quarter including the seven-week session, the two-week session, various conferences, seminars, workshops and the Creative Arts laboratory. All appointments have been recommended and approved by the division heads concerned. It will be noted that in a few instances staff members have not been definitely selected and names are omitted. However, the amount of salary is indicated and the courses or activity the person to be selected will have is also shown. Most of these are grouped on the last page.

Also attached is a separate sheet of all visiting faculty members recommended to date. You will note that the total figure for salaries, including small miscellaneous items, is \$144,702.00. It was possible to hold to this figure because of the voluntary action of our faculty in agreeing to be paid for the summer quarter on the basis of this year's rather than text year's salary.

I hope that some day it will be possible to plan for the summer quarter and have the legislators approve a budget for summer quarter which will be commensurate with the budget approved for the regular year. There is every reason to believe that our educational responsibilities will increase rather than decrease in the summer quarter if we are to do the job which needs to be done.

TO: ALL DEPARTMENT HEADS

SUBJECT:

The past session of the legislature created a Washington State Arts Commission. I have appointed its 21 members and the group recently held its first meeting. Members included the outstanding leaders of the arts. It is an extremely competent and talented group. John Ashby Conway, Professor of Drama, University of Washington, is the Chairman. His address is 4635 - 22nd, N.W., Seattle, Washington. It is my desire to use this commission in accordance with the intent of the legislature.

The law creating this commission states:

"It is hereby declared that the preservation and development of beauty is essential to the progress and growth of the State of Washington. The growth and development of the arts provides for the general welfare and is hereby declared to be appropriate matter of concern to the government of the State of Washington."

The law further provides that:

"The commission shall meet, study, plan and advise the Governor, the various departments of the state and the state legislature and shall make such recommendations as it deems proper for the beautification and cultural development of the State of Washington."

I strongly request that your agency consult the commission before it enters into any major development. This does not necessarily mean that you will be bound by their recommendations but their thinking and opinion should certainly be considered carefully. I think the commission can be extremely helpful in making suggestions to retain and increase esthetic values and yet permit effective and economic progress. In your letters of notification to the commission may I suggest that you submit your proposed place and ask them for any suggestions which they may have.
