Sept. 27, 1862.

Dear Parents-

It has been about a week since I wrote home. I should have written since but I have not been very well and thought every day as I lay around the camp and done nothing, that I would feel better and more like writing by the next day but yesterday morning I found myself so much worse I was not able to write yesterday at all so I came here to the hospital in the morning where I could receive treatment of the doctors. The hospital is well situated an a large brick farm house and I have all the care I can ask and feel much better this morning. I feel like I could eat some breakfast. I have tasted nothing but medicine for 45 hours and ate but little for two or three days before so I am getting pretty weak. There the door opens and in comes Capt.Hamilton with two letters for me and I must quit and read them. (One from Rose, and one from Sallie and all good news.

My sickness begun indiarhea and ended in flux but both are about stopped now and I think I shall get along soon. I can't comply with Lib's request this time as I can't write much lying here on my back but rest satisfied that rumor says more than it should. Write soon and direct as before.
