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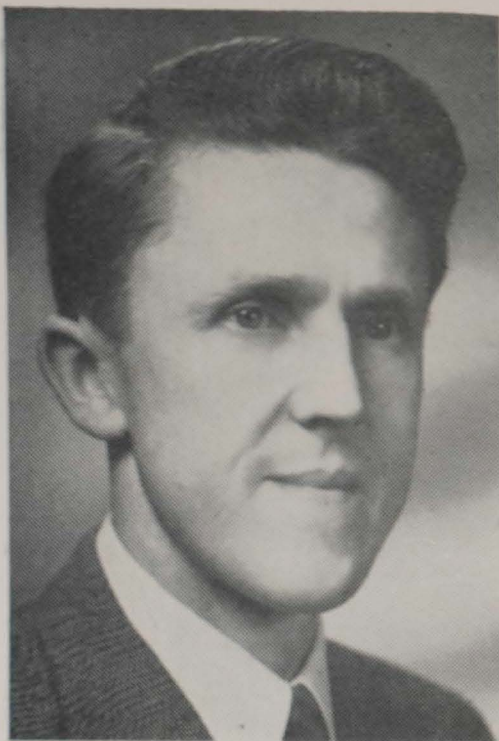

Dr. Mosher New Prexy

Dr. Raymond Mosher, former dean of educational services and summer session at San Jose State college in California, is Eastern's new president.

He brings a wide experience and a life time of service to education to his new position. He taught at the University of Idaho from 1928 through 1931, and he has taught summer sessions at Yale, Northwestern, the University of Missouri, Southern California, the University of Washington and the University of Idaho.

Dr. Mosher is vice president of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools in the Northwest. As vice president of the organization he is chairman of the Higher Education commission which handles all applications for new memberships and re-evaluation of present members. Dr. Mosher is also a member of the National Commission of Regional Representatives who work on national accreditation problems.

Ray Giles Writes Final Brief of School's "Affair"

The board of trustees and Dr. Otis Freeman met with Governor Langlie on July 26 to discuss the committee report made by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, selected to conduct the investigation of the affairs at Eastern for the governor.

Governor Langlie stated that he "was impressed with the thoroughness of this special study. The committee has put its finger on a series of weaknesses which have existed for some time in the administration and on the campus at Cheney," the governor stated.

"Its report is based on an unbiased probe for facts and as a result of its exhaustive study, it has made recommendations which I have submitted to the Eastern Washington College of Education board of trustees for their guidance."

On July 30 the board of trustees stated that they were prepared "to consider individual applications for reemployment of certain dismissed or resigned faculty members." On August 1, the seven dismissed faculty members, who had been offered reemployment providing they notify the president of their acceptance by August 1, accepted reemployment. They were William H. Drummond, Richard Miller, Dana Harter, L. E. Patmore, R. P. Whitfield, Paul Woolf, and Hope Cullen.

On August 3, the board of trustees announced that they were looking for a top-flight administrator to take over the presidency at Eastern for one year. This was one of the recommendations of the committee that a temporary president be named for a period of one year.

On August 3, the board of trustees announced the appointment of an advisory committee to aid in the selection of a new president for Eastern, which they announced they would appoint on August 5. The committee members were Dr. Robert McConnell, president of Central Washington College of Education; Dr. Joyce Cooper, assistant superintendent of state public instruction; P. A. Wright, former superintendent of schools at Richland, Wash.; Dr. Graham Dresler, of the EWCE English department; and Noble Leach, formerly as-

sociated with the Spokane public schools.

On August 6, the board announced that Dr. Raymond M. Mosher had been appointed president at Eastern for the coming year. Dr. Mosher was granted a leave of absence for the school year from San Jose State college, Calif., where he is dean of educational services and director of summer sessions, to accept the presidency of Eastern.

The board of trustees, at their August 22 meeting, rehired Richard H. Hagelin, assistant professor of education.

Dr. Mosher took over September 1 as president of Eastern for this year.

The board of trustees at their September 19 meeting rehired Dr. Obed Williamson as professor of education, and Mrs. Antoinette Dustin as associate professor of physical education.

Vivian Forkner Frederick, a sophomore this year, was awarded an alumni scholarship for the second year. Vivian was co-valedictorian of her Mead, Wash., high school graduating class. Her work at Eastern last year proved to be on the same high standing as that of her high school performance. Active in sports and debate, Vivian is a physical education major.

CORONATION OF QUEEN

Eastern has a record of 17 wins, 7 losses and 1 tie in Homecoming bouts since the first in 1924 when they blasted Central 33-0.

The last time these two tangled on EWC's Homecoming grid, the Savages came up with a 25-6 win—their second of that season, 1951.

Eastern's club, under the direction of ex-Eastern griddier Ed Chissus (class of '41), has brought football back into the limelight at Eastern, winning three games in four starts at this writing. Their most recent, a 35-9 rout of favored Western Washington, has Savage hopes high for a successful Evergreen campaign.

COFFEE HOUR, 4:30 P.M.

Following the game, grads will be treated to an informal coffee hour get-together sponsored by Ellen H. Richards in the social room in Showalter.

An annual affair, the coffee hour has been popular with grads as a place to meet and gab and warm up after the game.

OPEN HOUSE, 6-7:30 P.M.

In deference to those who will be getting ready for the Homecoming dance, hall visitations have been limited to an hour and a half this year. All residence halls will be open for alumni and students from 6-7:30.

TERRITORIAL TANGLE, 9 P.M.

The annual Homecoming dance, this year dubbed the Territorial Tangle in keeping with the theme of Homecoming and nature of Home-

coming dances, will feature Ralph Dickinson and his orchestra in the Martin hall gymnasium from 9 to 12.

Future Teachers of America is in charge of the semi-formal corsage affair, with Lorraine Mushlitz as chairman of the dance committee.

This year's Homecoming queen will be presented during intermission by ASB President Don Childress.

A memorial services for Dr. Kingston was held in Showalter auditorium October 15. Dr. Obed Williamson, long-time friend of Dr. Kingston, presided.

Ex-Savages Lead Eastern Gridders

Two ex-Savage stars are guiding football fortunes at Eastern this year. Ed Chissus, head coach, and Bill Nye, line coach and trainer, are both new to college coaching.

Chissus, a graduate of 1941, coached at Sunnyside high school last year, and Nye, class of 47, coached at Grandview. So far in this young season they have piloted the Eastern grid machine to more wins than the team has managed in the past two years.

Their record to date: A surprising 14 to 6 upset over the Idaho State college Bengals to end an 11-skein winning streak and set the Rocky Mountain conference champs back on their heels. CHEMISTRY LAB MOVES

In lieu of a chemistry building, a chemistry laboratory has been established in the basement of Showalter hall at a construction cost of \$31,000, according to Marion H. Surbeck, director of physical plant.

Other improvements on the campus during the summer included new lighting in the main reading room at Hargreaves library, and new lights in the art department in the library building.

Historians, educators, business men and friends attended the services, planned by a committee, appointed by Dr. Raymond Mosher, EWCE president, and including Dr. Williamson, Miss Cecil Dryden, EWCE history professor, and W. L. Rowles, head of the music department.

Acting president of Eastern three times, Dr. Kingston was also vice president of the school and head of the history and social science department until retirement from administrative duties in 1940.

Dr. Kingston was principal of Spokane high school (now Lewis and Clark) from 1897 to 1901 when he came to EWCE. An authority on the history of the early Northwest, he had made written contributions to his field. He was awarded an honorary doctor of philosophy degree by Washington State college "for distinguished service to the history of the Northwest."

Born in Potsdam, N.Y., 1870, he was a graduate of St. Lawrence university and received an M.A. from the University of Michigan. In the words of Dr. Williamson, "We have lost our most distinguished teacher and historian in the history of the school."

A lasting memorial to Dr. Kingston on the Eastern campus is the C. S. Kingston Northwest library, a collection of manuscripts and books of Northwest history, in Hargreaves library. Dr. Kingston had been compiling the material for 15 years. The famed educator would have been 83 on October 6.

Funeral services were held in Sacramento, Calif., October 5. Cremation followed and the ashes were sent to Canton, N.Y. to be buried there in the Kingston family plot.
