The Savages shoot for their second Evergreen conference win tonight, hosting the Pacific Lutheran Gladiators. The Savage eleven is currently tied with the Lutes, Western and Central for the second spot in loop standings. All four teams have 1-1 records.

Coach Marv Harshman's PLC crew won their first game of the season last weekend in Tacoma downing Central, 7-6, in the Lutes' homecoming game. Earlier this season the Gladiators lost to Humboldt State, College of Puget Sound (non-conference) and to Western, 8-7, in the conference opener at Bellingham two weeks ago.

Eastern is sporting a 3-1 record for their first four games this season. Dick Graham, frosh passing star from Kennewick, will be counted on to carry the offensive load for the Red Raiders with John Ditz, the Savages' ground-gaining mainstay on the shelf with a bad shoulder. Graham's main target is lanky Bernie Hancock who was instrumental in Eastern's 35-19 win over Western last week, catching five passes for 186 yards and a touchdown.

The Savages have won seven of 13 previous meetings between the two schools with the Lutes winning five and tying one.

## BILL NYE

Bill Nye is another Eastern grad, graduating from the Cheney institution in the spring of 1947. He graduated from prep school at Lewis & Clark in Spokane where he was an all-city quarterback for two years.

At Eastern he quarterbacked the 1940 grid squad and was drafted after the second game of the 1941 season. Nye spent 3½ years in the army at Ft. Lewis playing for the Warriors' football team. After the war he was assigned to assist in taking groups of POW's to England and France before he was discharged from military service. He returned to Eastern in 1946 and was a center on the Savage football team for the next two years. Nye was Scarlet Arrow honorary captain in 1947 and received all-conference honors as a senior.

Upon graduation Nye began his coaching career at Waterville guiding football, basketball and baseball teams at the Class B school for two years. From Waterville he went to Granger for three years. During his third year at Granger, Nye's squad ranked sixth among the state's Class B schools with an 8-1 record. In the fall of 1952 he moved to Class A Grandview.

Nye will serve as head baseball coach, assistant basketball coach, trainer along with being line coach for the 1953 Savage football squad.

# Gladiators Pack Punch.....

Pacific Lutheran College, defending champions of the Evergreen conference, got a slow start this fall, dropping their first three games. The Lutes notched their first win of the season last Saturday in Tacoma, clipping the Central Washington Wildcats, 7-6. However, the Gladiators from Parkland are expected to be rough the remainder of the season with Marv Harshman's crew still one of the league's better teams.

Harshman is starting his third year as head grid coach at PLC after assisting Marv Tommervik for five seasons. In 1951, his first year as head mentor, Harshman's charges ended in a three-way tie for first place with Western and CPS. Last year the Lutes picked up a clean-cut championship by downing Eastern, 20-19, at Tacoma in one of the Glad's rougher games of the season. Harshman is also head basketball and baseball coach at PLC and is director of athletics.

Forming the nucleus of this year's team are Ron Billings, Bill Borden, Jim Ball, Frank Karwoski and Frank Lancaster. Billings was a first-string Associated Press little all-American linebacker last year as a junior and is having another terrific season for the Lutes. He kicked the extra point against Central last week to provide the margin of victory.

Borden, the biggest man on the field, stands 6-3 and weighs 240 pounds. Lancaster, a transfer from WSC, is one of the Glads' top runners and a former all-state back from Puyallup. Ball is effective both ways at end and Karwoski is another of the league's better backs. Keep your eyes on these fellows tonight!

# Head Coach---

## Ed Chissus

In keeping with recent Eastern policy of hiring graduates as coaches, Ed Chissus was selected this summer for the head football mentor's position to replace A. H. Poffenroth. Chissus is a 1941 graduate of EWCE.

Chissus completed high school at Wapato where he was one of the finest athletes in the Yakima Valley. He lettered in four sports in prep school and earned a total of 11 letters. After graduation from Wapato in the spring of 1937 he enrolled at Cheney.

Track and football were the new coach's standout sports at Cheney. He lettered at end on the football team under the tutelage of W. B. (Red) Reese. However, Chissus really made his college athletic name on the track team where for 4 years he was unbeaten in WINCO league competition in both the high and low hurdles. His records in those two events still stand in WINCO league statistics. (The WINCO loop was succeeded by the Evergreen conference in 1948.) "Easy Ed" graduated from EWCE in the spring of 1941 and began his coaching career at Monroe Junior High in Monroe, Washington that same fall.

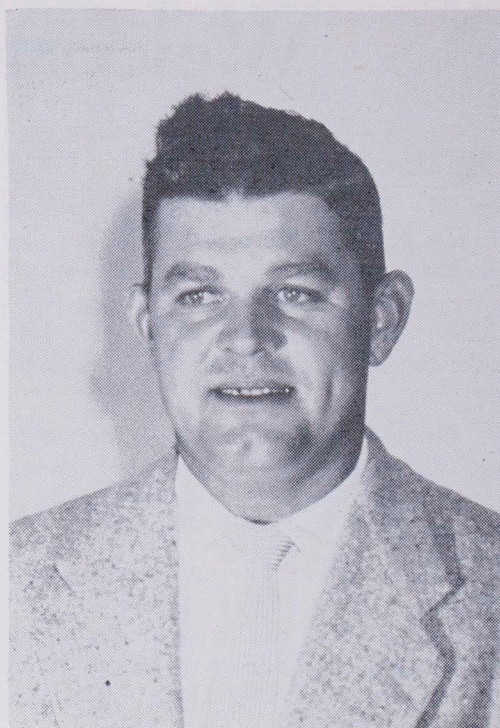
Chissus moved to Mabton the following year and in the fall of 1943 took over the coaching chores at Zillah high school where his teams won the Yakima Valley Class B championship two years in a row. Zillah had a 13-game winning skein going at one time over the two-year reign.

Uncle Sam asked for Ed after the football season of 1944 and the new EWCE coach was sent to Fort Sill, Oklahoma where he spent two years in the army as a field artillery instructor.

He resumed his coaching career in 1947 at Wapato junior high school. In 1948 he took over the football and track coaching duties at Wapato high school and his grid squads either tied or won Valley championships for four straight years. Some of Chissus' finest athletes were produced at Wapato, including—Meryl Bauer, regular end on this year's football squad at EWCE, Jim Bauer, Meryl's brother and a star on the frosh squad at Washington State last fall and Jerry Tilton, an end for Central Washington at Ellensburg.

In 1952 Chissus moved to Sunnyside where he was head football coach and director of athletics. His top product at Sunnyside was LeRoay Johnson, an all-state football player who later signed a professional baseball contract.

Chissus was married in 1939 and has three children, Judy, 12, Terry 9, and Jane 8.

# Welcome To EWCE

## THE CAMPUS

The Eastern Washington College has a 40-acre campus four blocks from the Columbia Basin Highway. Shrubs and native pine trees, as well as birch, fir, maple, spruce, ash, willow, elm, locust and other trees help to make the campus attractive at all seasons of the year.

*Showalter Hall*, the administration building, contains administrative offices, classrooms, natural and applied science laboratories, and the college auditorium.

*Martin Hall*, the college elementary school building, is somewhat unique in that it was definitely planned not only to meet the needs of children doing elementary school work but to serve as a teacher education center as well.

*Hargreaves Library*. The Hargreaves Library is a beautiful structure in modern Roman style of terra cotta and brick with tile roof. The building is air-conditioned with re-circulating air and is provided with a cooling system for use in the summer.

*The Dormitories* — The new Women's Dorm, Senior Hall, Monroe Hall, Hudson Hall and Sutton Hall—are modern and fully equipped homes. Students find the grand pianos, radios, television sets, the large lounge rooms for reading, dancing and receptions, the candy kitchens and the laundry rooms conducive to their comfort.

The huge *Fieldhouse* is used principally

for physical education and athletics and also houses the ROTC department at EWCE. The 610-foot long structure includes two men's gymnasiums, one girls' gym, a swimming pool, ample locker rooms and an indoor track. EWCE's fieldhouse, one of the school's proudest possessions, is one of the finest of its type among the nation's small colleges which number over 500.

In the *Industrial Arts Building* are the shops for woodworking, metal, concrete, radio and electrical construction. The college print shop and drafting rooms are also in this building.

The *Music Building*, less than five years old, is devoted to band, choral and orchestra activities, and houses a library of recordings and musical scores, ensemble and practice rooms, as well as studios for piano, wind and string instruments. The *Music Annex*, a remodeled government building, has listening and practice rooms, a classroom, studios for voice and piano, and the main office of the division of music.

*Showalter Hall Annex* houses the typing classes and provides some office space. The college *Infirmery* houses individual wards for men and women students. *Ratcliffe House*, the school's student union building, includes a snack bar, dining rooms, dance floors, lounge, card and game rooms. It also has a television set for the students' enjoyment and is one of the most popular places on the campus.
