1954 SAVAGE GRIDIRON OUTLOOK

Fifty-four frosh were among the 75 aspirants which greeted Coach Ed Chissus during the first week of practice and from early season indications it looks as though several of these first-year men are going to figure strongly in Eastern's 1954 football picture.

Chissus has ten letterman back, but lost all last year's starting line with the exception of three-year award winner Willard Julum. Three backs, Gary Davis, Don Faraca and Dick Graham, all starters at one time last season, have quit or transferred. Graham was a topnotch passer, completing 34 for 83 attempts and 600 yards in only seven games to rank among the small college leaders. Faraca was the team's top scorer and Davis was the ground-gaining leader for the past two seasons.

Biggest loss in the line was at ends where Chissus lost Bernie Hancock and Meryl Bauer, two of the finest in the league. Bauer graduated and Hancock is in the service. Hancock was one of the top receivers in the country last fall, hauling in 30 aerials for 404 yards. Bauer and Faraca were the other good receivers, each catching ten for better than 200 yards.

The Savages lost their two front-line centers by graduation and will be hurting at the position also. However, the biggest headache is at quarterback which will probably be the weakest spot on the team. The Red Raiders have one experienced end, two lettermen tackles, two guards and after that come the frosh.

1954 SAVAGE GRIDIRON OUTLOOK CONTINUED

Chissus, operating with the unbalanced line single-wing offense, has lettermen back at every backfield position except quarterback. Returning veterans include Ray Koziuk, rugged tailback from Chewelah; Myron Rasmussen, the Deer Park speed merchant; Keith Mortensen, hardrunning sophomore fullback from Zillah; George Foster, halfback from Vancouver, and John Ditz, Chehalis halfback who is co-holder of the Evergreen 100-yard dash record. Chissus should field the fastest backfield in the league.

Letter winners returning in the line include Julum, expected to be the stalwart of the forward wall at his tackle position; Jack Collins, sophomore guard from Mead; Harley Allen, an end from Metaline Falls; Leon Horton, 240-pound guard from Spokane and Gene Siegel a letterman tackle in 1952 who was ineligible last year. Siegel, weighing 240 also, has been hampered with injuries early in the season but should be of help by the third game.

Among the bright frosh prospects in the line are Ron Sperber, Colville end; Dick Miller, Port Townsend tackle; George Smith, guard from North Central in Spokane; Wally Woodard, a tackle from North Central; Max Chandler, tackle from Colville and Dale Van Wormer, Zillah center. In the backfield the top first year players appear to be Dick Huston, big Wapato fullback; Tom Delys, popular Cheney quarterback and Ken Hall, 5 foot 5 inch halfback from Chewelah.

MEET THE COACHES -- ED CHISSUS

Big Ed Chissus starts his second season as head football coach at Eastern after posting a fine 6-2 record against good competition last fall in his first year. "Easy. Ed" has ten lettermen returning, but must rely on a large freshman crop to make up the nucleus of the squad.

Chissus, a former athletic great at Eastern, graduated in the spring of 1941 and began his coaching career at Monroe, Washington that same fall. Ed moved to Mabton the following year and in the fall of 1943 he took the coaching chores at Zillah where his teams won the Yakima Valley Class B championship two years in a row.

He resumed his coaching in 1947, after two years in the army, at Wapato Junior High and the next year moved up to the high school as football and track coach. The next four years his squads either tied or won the Yakima Valley championship. In 1952 he moved to Sunnyside where he was head grid coach and director of athletics. He came to Eastern after one year at Sunnyside.

Chissus was married in 1939 and has three children, Judy 13, Terry 10, and Jane 9.

LINE COACH -- GENE BADGLEY

Gene Badgley comes to Eastern from Corvallis, Oregon where he coached high school athletics for four years. Preceding his tenure at Corvallis, Badgley coached three years at Philomath, Oregon. Genial Gene will assist Red Reese in basketball and coach baseball in addition to his duties as line coach for the Savages.

Gene is originally from Pleasantville, Ohio where he was a great high school athlete. Badgley went to college at Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa and played basketball, baseball and football for three years before he went into the army.

The infantry occupied Gene for the next five years, mostly in the European campaign. Badgley rose to the rank of captain while in the army. A severe leg wound which Badgley sustained in Europe earned him the Purple Heart, among other decorations.

However, that leg wound practically spelled the end of Badgley's college athletic career. He finished his college at the University of Colorado in Boulder and despite his leg injury, managed to play baseball. He graduated in 1947 with a BS degree in physical education.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES ENDS

(26) Harley Allen-- Only letterman end returning this fall, Allen will be a starter in all probability. Only a sophomore, Allen is 6-3 and has good hands on him, capable of becoming a good receiver.

(7) Phil Roth--Missed last season because of a knee injury he suffered in an early practice. This sophomore wing was All-city in Portland at Franklin high school in 1953. Potentially Eastern's best receiver, Roth does a good job when it comes to going both ways. Small for an end, he makes up for it with aggressiveness.

(11) Ron Sperber--This Colville frosh is one of the top first-year gridders Chissus has and is slated to see plenty of starting duty before the season is over. Another small man for end, Sperber plays a terrific game both ways. Also does a little bit of everything in track and is certain to help Red Reese in that sport next spring.

(29) Bob Meeker--This big frosh from Almira has shown plenty in early practices and stands an excellent chance to beat Allen out of the starting left end position. Bothered early in the season with a cleated hand which required seven stitches. Still played his effective game, despite the injury.

(14) Doyle Slechta--One of the few players Eastern has had from Cashmere, Slechta is a loose, lanky lad with a desire to play football. Should figure prominently in future EWCE football seasons. Also played basketball and baseball at Cashmere. (20) Joe Welp--One of only three out-of-staters on the ball club, Welp has looked sharp in early practices and will see lots of action for the savages this season and in the future. Another of Chissus' many, many frosh. Received honorable mention all-state last year at Gresham, Oregon. Also plays basketball and is expected to help the track team next spring.

TACKLES

(22) Willard Julum-Starting his fourth year of varsity football at Eastern, Julum is the third straight EWCE athlete who has been elected Associated Student Body president. Julum, a three-year letter winner from Highline in Seattle, loves football and was second team all-conference last fall. A real tough customer.

(32) Eugene Siegel--One of the biggest men on this year's squad, Siegel weighs in at 240 pounds. Ineligible last fall, Siegel was a regular as a frosh in 1952. Hampered at the start of this season with a bad shoulder but will help out immensely for the Savages on the left side of the line. Should have a good season. Plenty capable of going both ways.

(28) Dick Miller--This husky frosh has shown good stuff ever since the first day of practice and is just the guy who could be a 60-minute player all season. Will probably start for the Savages. Also kicks off and effective at booting extra points. Played basketball and base-ball in addition to football at Port Townsend.

(24) Wally Woodard--An all-city tackle at North Central High School in Spokane last fall, Woodard is big and aggressive. Probably won't be a starter until next fall, but could come through this season. Plays lacrosse in the summertime to keep in shape.

(29) Max Chandler--Another of the large frosh crop, Chandler stands 6-3 and weighs 224 pounds. Sparkled in early practice sessions and will see lots of action for the Red Raiders. Played three years in high school and was Tri-county as a senior. Was a teammate of Ron Sperber's in high school at Colville.

(15) Bob Wolford--A sophomore from Athena, Oregon, Wolford turned out last year and didn't make the team. However, he's back again this fall bigger and faster and will undoubtedly help out this season.

GUARDS

(27) Jack Collins-Sophomore letterman from Mead, Collins saw lots of action last year as a frosh and his experience will be valuable in the middle of the line. Also lettered last spring in track as a javelin thrower. Was an outstanding high school athlete.

(18) George Smith--One of the three frosh who are expected to break into the starting lineup, Smith is a graduate of North Central in Spokane and was an all-city second team tackle selection last fall. Has been transferred to guard by Chissus where he has been turning in a fine job. Plays lacrosse in the summer. (23) Don McGee--Graduated from Dayton high school in 1950 and then spent three years in the army playing football in Germany before he decided to come to school at Eastern. Many good things are expected of this 200-pound frosh guard.

(19) Ralph Orey--One of two hometowners on the squad, Orey graduated from Cheney High School three years ago. Well-proportioned and fast, Orey should see lots of action for the Red Raiders this fall.

(16) Jack Merriman--One of the youngest men on the squad. Merriman is only 17, but he plays football like nobody's business. Loaded with determination and scrap, lettered three years at Sunnyside in football and boxing.

(33) Leon Horton--The other returning letterman at guard along with Collins, Horton came to school weighing 240 pounds but is expected to weigh 225-230 during the season. One of the mainstays last season, Horton started several games and if he gets his weight down he could be a starter this fall.

CENTERS

(31) Dick Hollenbeck--a good defensive player, Hollenbeck started late last season and didn't letter. Big things are expected of this Tekoa sophomore in his first regular season. Probable starter for the Savages at the pivot position.

HALFBACKS

(4) Ray Koziuk--Two-year letterman left halfback from Chewelah, Koziuk is one of the top defensive halfbacks in the confernece and was second in the league last fall in pass interceptions and first in runbacks of interceptions. Transferred from Humboldt State after playing his first year under former Washington State college coach Phil Sarboe.

(12) Myron Rasmussen--Starting his third season at Eastern, Rasmussen is probably the fastest halfback in the league. He holds the Evergreen quarter-mile record and is a great track man. Should enjoy a good season if an old leg injury doesn't slow him down. Returned a punt 72 yards last season for a touchdown.

(5) John Ditz--Letterman halfback from Chehalis, Ditz saw starting action last fall and played steady ball for the Savages. Another speed demon, Ditz is co-holder of the Evergreen 100-yard dash record. Will go all the way anytime he gets past the secondary.

(2) George Foster--Lightest man on the squad. Foster lettered last year after transferring from Clark Junior College in his hometown of Vancouver. Carried the ball thirty times last fall and wound up with a net of two yards, but is capable of slipping away for five-six yards when needed.

(1) Ken Hall--Shortest man on the squad and one of three players from Chewelah, Hall showed plenty in early practices, despite his size and is being counted on for future service. Good breakaway runner, has plenty of speed. (13) Dale Van Wormer--Will help back up Hollenbeck at the pivot slot. Has plenty of spirit and hustle. Had a fine athletic career in high school at Zillah where he was a teammate of fullback Keith Mortensen.

QUARTERBACKS

(9) Tom Martin--Turned out last season but didn't suit up until the final game of the season. Martin will probably share quarterbacking assignments with frosh Tom Delys.

(10) Tom Delys--An all-state alternate at Cheney last fall, Delys was a terrific ground gainer at fullback. However, Chissus has switched him to quarterback to make full use of his many talents. One of the few married men on the team.

(17) Leo Chandler--This former Gonzaga High School gridder displays good form at times and will see action this fall at the signal-calling post. Transfer from the University of Idaho.

(3) Don Jones--Another speedy frosh halfback, Jones is from Quincy and should develop into a fine football player. Jones also plays basketball and ran one of the best quarter-miles in the state high school circles last spring.

(67) Larry Cremeen--One of the Inland Empire's high-scoring prep hoop stars last winter at Wilbur, Cremeen is also right at home on the gridiron. Has lots of speed and power and figures highly in Chissus' future plans. Should help the basketball team this winter.

FULLBACKS

(25) Keith Mortensen--Best fullback Eastern has had since Little All-American Meriel Michelson, Mortensen can buck through the middle or has the speed to sweep the ends. One of Eastern's leading ground gainers last season, this hard-running fullback should really ramble this fall.

(21) Dick Høuston--A muscular 200-pounder from Wapato, Høuston stands an outside chance of splitting the fullback duties with Mortensen. Extremely fast for a heavy man, one of the best sprinters in the Yakima Valley last spring. Has looked terrific in early practices.

(6) Ken Crawford--Shifted from halfback to full, Crawford has taken the change in stride and from the start never left any doubt about the fact that he was out to make the ball club.
