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CELEBRATING BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History Month is one of the most revered times of the year for people of African descent in the United States. Founded in 1926, by prominent Black scholar and activist Carter G. Woodson, February was selected to give homage to the plethora of achievements and contributions of Black people in the Untied States. Originally it was organized as "Negro History Week" during the second week of February to recognize also the birthdays of President Abraham Lincoln and abolitionist and orator Frederick Douglass. The month is celebrated throughout the country by schools, churches, businesses, and community organizations with elaborate events and festivities. Black heroines and heroes from the past and present are honored and important landmarks in Black history are observed.
