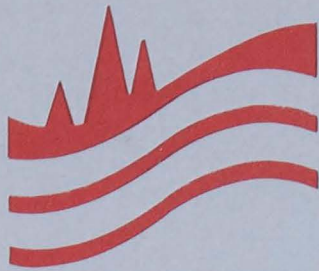
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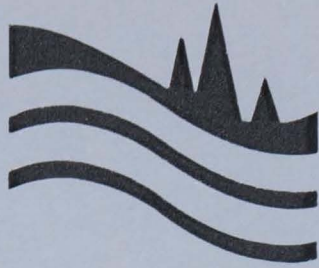
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MEDALS & AWARDS

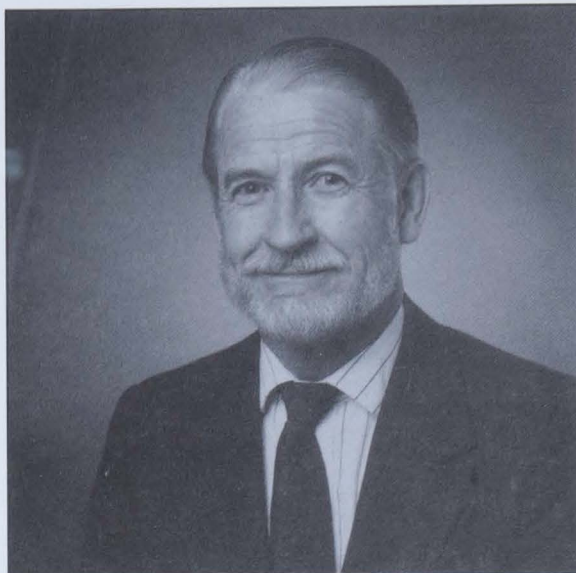


Trustees' Medal

Dale F. Stradling

Dale F. Stradling has taught in the Department of Geography at Eastern since 1965. He received his B.A. in education at Eastern in 1952, and both his B.A. in Geography and M.Ed. in 1958. Stradling is exceptionally well qualified for the Trustees' Medal in all three of the required criteria:

He is an outstanding and demanding instructor who teaches at the frontiers of his discipline and inspires students with his own love of learning.

He has an active and impressive research record which has added significantly to our understanding of the natural and human evolution of the Pacific Northwest. Much of his work is interdisciplinary and combines his training in geography and geomorphology with a variety including geology, biology, anthropology, archaeology and environmental studies.

He was the prime mover for the development of the Earth Science Education program's curriculum. This is designed to train teachers to introduce accurate, rigorous, and relevant earth science education into the public schools.

Stradling is a member of the American Quaternary Association, the Association of American Geographers, the Association of Pacific Coast Geographers, and the Association of Washington Geographers. He also belongs to the Geological Society of America, the National Association of Geology Teachers, of which he is the Northwest Section President, and the Northwest Scientific Association.



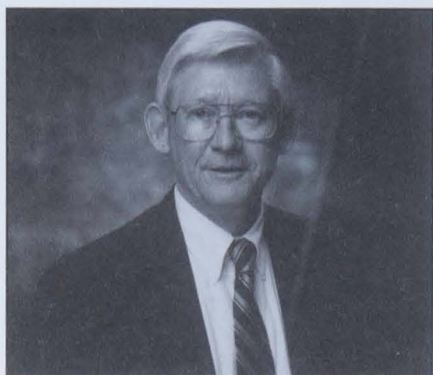
Burlington Northern Foundation Faculty Achievement Award

These awards consist of certificates and cash prizes of \$1,500 each. Funded by the Burlington Northern Foundation, they are presented to recognize "significant and distinguished achievement in teaching and scholarship" and to acknowledge unusual effort devoted to classroom instruction, setting high standards for student learning, and the impact of the faculty member on his or her involvement with students. Faculty members must also have demonstrated their own scholarly advancement by having published a book or contributed an article to a nationally recognized journal or collection during the preceding year.

The Burlington Northern Foundation represents Burlington Northern, Inc., and its operating companies. Although the Foundation has established the criteria for the award, any member of the university can nominate any regular, tenured, or tenure-track faculty member who fulfills the criteria. The Medals and Awards Committee accepts these nominations and makes the final selections.

Donald C. Wall

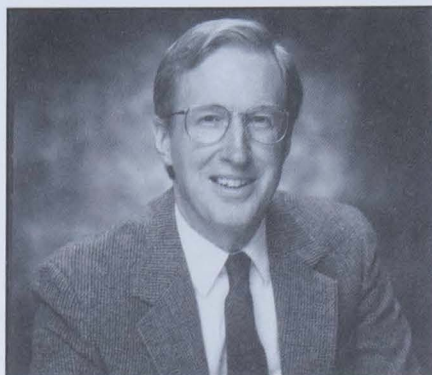
Students entering their first college literature class are often prepared for lengthy lectures on complex literary themes which seem to have no bearing on their present lives. Dr. Don Wall, however, never fails to bring to each class his own unique sense of humor, and a profound love for his job.

Student evaluations of Wall's teaching are outstanding and represent some of the highest scores in the English Department.

A professor of English and Humanities, Wall came to Eastern in 1970. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Syracuse University and his master's and Ph.D. from Florida State University.

Wall's professional and community activities include serving as an officer in the Popular Culture Association and speaking on literary topics throughout the Pacific Northwest. He also serves as chair of the Cheney Board of Parks Commissioners, and represents the City of Cheney on the Tri-Agency Board.

He has been published extensively. Among his works are "An Interview With James McClure," recently published as part of the text *The Mysteries of Africa*; and "Teaching the Social Sciences Can Be a Crime."



J. William T. Youngs

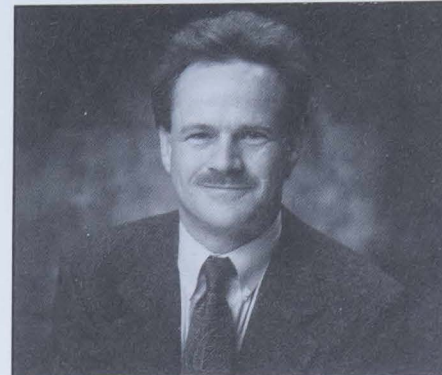
It takes a special kind of magic to bring antiquity to life for students with feet firmly planted in the 20th century. Bill Youngs possesses that sort of magic, and has exhibited it with a flourish since first arriving at Eastern in 1972.

A professor of history, he earned his B.A. from Harvard, then a master's and Ph.D. from the University of California, Berkeley.

Two factors are of special interest to Youngs as he prepares for each course: providing as accurate a picture of the past as possible, and teaching students to clearly express themselves in writing about the past.

He provides lasting impressions through role-playing and a total immersion in the sights, sounds and popular culture of any given period. He also encourages students to improve their writing skills, and introduces them to technological innovations, including desktop publishing.

Youngs routinely receives rave reviews by students. Many enter his classes expecting dusty recitations of names and dates, and are delighted to see history come to life through a variety of media – including his own portrayals of historic figures or average men in historically significant times.



Dana C. Elder

In the face of a nationwide concern over deteriorating student writing skills, Dr. Dana Elder, associate professor of English, is doing something constructive to correct the problem.

Elder, who came to Eastern in 1984, is a strong advocate of learning enhancement through outcomes assessment. He is also primarily responsible for an experimental student writing project called the Writing Enriched Course, or WEC.

With Dr. Larry Beason, assistant professor of English, he conducted a 1990 faculty workshop to prepare Eastern for the WEC program. The following quarter, several follow-up meetings revealed the program's marked success. In fact, so remarkable were the results of the initial WEC experiment, that additional sessions are planned and the WEC concept is now part of an Undergraduate Affairs Committee proposal to upgrade undergraduate writing requirements.

As director of the English Composition Program, Elder has made similar improvements of students' writing skills. His scholarly activity is outstanding, and his recently published textbook *Writing to Write* is expected to have nationwide use.



Clarence D. Martin Founder's Medal

The Eastern Washington University Founder's Medal is given in the name of Clarence Daniel Martin, Governor of the state of Washington from 1933 to 1941. Martin was the first native son to be elected governor of Washington. He completed the three-year course at the State Normal School at Cheney and later earned a bachelor's degree at the University of Washington. Martin devoted many years to improving higher education. He supported an open door admissions policy for the state's colleges and universities, guaranteeing admission to any graduate of an accredited high school. His tenure as governor brought a judicious and timely expansion of higher education facilities.

The award recognizes state and national educational leaders who have made a major contribution to the maintenance and development of higher learning committed to academic excellence and service to the eastern Washington community.

Emerson C. Shuck

Dr. Emerson C. Shuck was Eastern's president from September 1967 until December 1976. He came to Eastern from a position as vice president for academic affairs at Ohio Wesleyan University. Prior to that, he had been dean of the college of liberal arts at Bowling Green State University.

Shuck was born in 1916 in Findlay, Ohio. He earned his bachelor's degree with honors from Otterbein College, Westerville, Ohio, in 1938, with majors in biology, chemistry and English. He earned his master's in English at Ohio State University a year later, and his doctorate in American literature and philosophy from the University of Wisconsin in 1943.

Shuck's tenure at Eastern was marked by significant internal changes at the institution, including a restructuring of both administrative and academic components. This change, plus the wealth of academic expertise brought by new faculty employed during these rapid growth years, laid the foundation for future university status.

Departmental specialization, awareness and identity increased under Shuck. Important new professional programs were introduced to the community, and specialized study programs were nurtured, moving them closer to establishment as schools. At the same time, graduate study grew in scholarly stature at Eastern.

In 1976, Shuck resigned his post as president in order to return to teaching in Eastern's English department. He held this full-time position until July 1981, when he took on the job of Centennial Coordinator, overseeing the observance of the centennial of Eastern's founding as the Benjamin P. Cheney Academy. At Commencement ceremonies in June 1982, he was awarded the status of University President, Emeritus.

Since retirement, Dr. and Mrs. Shuck have continued to reside in Cheney.



Benjamin P. Cheney Medal

The Benjamin P. Cheney Medal is Eastern Washington University's highest award. This medal is named in honor of Benjamin P. Cheney, an early-day pioneer, businessman and educator.

Cheney played an integral part in the development of the West. A founder of the American Express Company, director of the Wells Fargo Bank and several major railroads, he is the classic example of the "self-made man."

Born in 1815 to a New Hampshire family of modest means, Cheney showed early promise in the field of transportation. Under the patronage of such prominent figures as Daniel Webster, his interests in transportation expanded, eventually leading him to form his own stage company. He possessed a shrewd business sense, and he combined hard work with a strict moral code to create a financial empire which spanned the continent.

Cheney was proud of the fact that he had accomplished this with very little formal education; but, unlike many of his counterparts with similar backgrounds, he did not fail to see the value of education. This was evident when he was approached in 1881 by the citizens of the new western frontier town which bore his name. The community which sprung up to serve his railroad was in need of a school.

Benjamin Cheney responded with a donation of \$10,000. He said he wanted the children of Cheney to have the educational opportunities which were denied him. That institution—the Benjamin P. Cheney Academy—has evolved into Eastern Washington University. Benjamin P. Cheney Hall, the home of the Department of Industrial Technology, is named in his honor. The portraits of Cheney and his wife, Elizabeth, hang in the main stairwell of the university library.

The descendents of Benjamin P. Cheney continue to be benefactors of the university. Ruth Cheney Streeter Hall is named in honor of his granddaughter.

Nominations for the Benjamin P. Cheney Medal may be made by any member of the Eastern Washington University community. The individuals chosen must have achieved national or international recognition for their contribution to learning, culture, or the betterment of the human condition.

The Mary Shields Wilson Medallion Award

The Mary Shields Wilson Medallion Award was established in 1981 as a tribute to Mary Shields Wilson (Mrs. Frederick Wilson, Jr.), who served on the Board of Trustees of Eastern Washington University from 1968 to 1981. During that period, she was elected chairwoman of the Board on three different occasions. Mrs. Wilson is an outstanding citizen, an educational leader and a tireless advocate of quality in American higher education.

The purpose of the award is to recognize outstanding graduating seniors who have demonstrated notable achievements in the following areas: academic abilities, leadership potential, and service to the university. Recipients have distinguished themselves as exceptionally capable individuals, both academically and with regard to extracurricular activities.

The award consists of a 2-inch diameter bronze medallion and a framed certificate describing the award. The names of recipients of the Mary Shields Wilson Medallion have been engraved on a plaque and are displayed in the Pence Union Building.

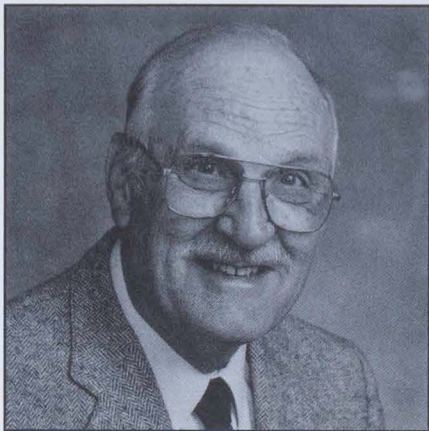
Alumnus Service Award

Harris A. Taylor

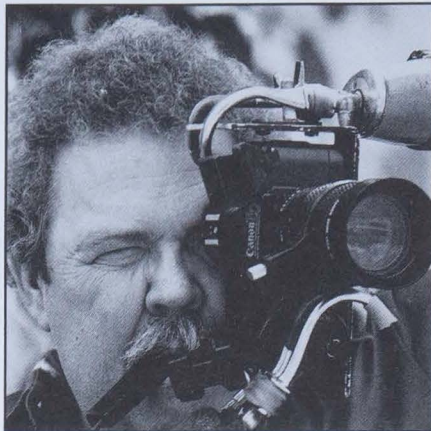
Dr. Harris A. Taylor worked 34 years as a teacher, school administrator and consultant in Washington, Oregon and California. In the 1960s, he headed a five-year Ford Foundation project on team teaching and was recognized as a national authority on the subject.

A star football player at Eastern, Dr. Taylor graduated with a B.A. in 1943 and later returned for his master's in 1950. He earned a doctorate from Stanford University in 1954.

Taylor served as associate professor of education, Claremont Graduate School, from 1959-64; superintendent of the Carlsbad, California, Union School District, 1964-66; and superintendent of the Carmel, California, Unified School District, 1966-78.

Taylor is active in Rotary, International, and has served as a chapter president; He is a Paul Harris Fellow, and he was also recognized in the early 1960s as one of two national leaders in team teaching, staff utilization and modular scheduling.

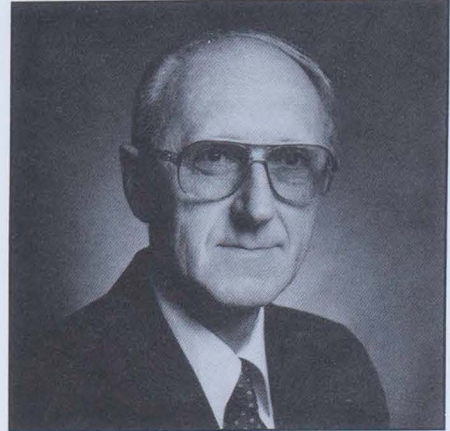
Alan R. Williams

Alan Williams is a part-time inventor, amateur photographer and active outdoorsman, who accomplished all of this, and much more, despite the loss of both feet and both hands to amputation. He graduated from Eastern in 1972 with a degree in natural science.

Williams became a quadruple amputee after undergoing a kidney transplant operation and ingesting medication that later restricted circulation in his limbs. A Denver resident, he now works through several groups to counsel and assist the disabled.

Among his many innovations, Williams helped create a program sponsored by the National Forest Service that enables disabled individuals to visit wilderness campsites. His own inspiration, he says, is his wife Kathleen and daughter Sommer.

John H. Lothspeich

A well-known Spokane civic leader and one-time assistant to Eastern president Emerson Schuck, John H. Lothspeich received a bachelor of arts in education in 1948, and a master's in 1952.

Lothspeich served as principal of Moses Lake High School from 1957 to 1961. After serving as a Kellogg Graduate Fellow in the University of California system from 1961-62, Lothspeich came to Eastern as Associate Director of Field Services. In 1967, he became Assistant to the President, and from 1973 to 1978, he served as Director of University Relations. Lothspeich also served as national director of the People to People High School Student Ambassador Program in Spokane from 1979 to 1983.

Lothspeich is a former president of the EWU Alumni Association, a director of the Eagle Athletic Association and has been an active volunteer with United Way, Spokane Chamber of Commerce, American Red Cross, Spokane County Zoological Society and numerous other groups.



Distinguished Service Award

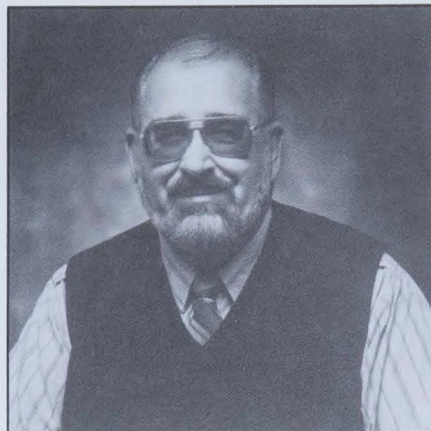

James Mowatt

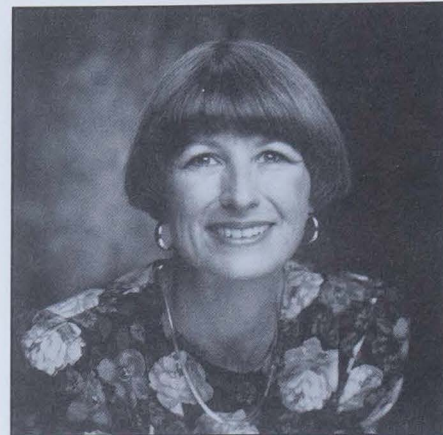
Few individuals are such an integral part of university operations as Jim Mowatt, Custodial Services Manager. Employed by Eastern since 1964, Mowatt has been a motivating force for the university community.

Hired as a Custodial Worker I in 1964, he was promoted to level III in 1969, and again to supervisory level in 1972. In 1974 he was promoted to his present position. For the past 17 years, he has successfully managed a department of 60 full-time employees and 60 part-time student employees.

Mowatt has developed a well-deserved reputation as the "Recycling King" of Eastern. He has been active on the university's Recycling Committee, the City of Cheney Recycling Advisory Committee, and the State Policy Committee on Recycling -All Agencies. He also developed the audio-visual instructions for recycling used by Eastern and other state institutions.

He has worked diligently on a variety of state-level committees, among these: the Washington State Central Stores Advisory Committee, the University Planning and Budgeting Advisory Council, and the Washington State Floor Finish Committee. He is also a member of the Washington Association of Maintenance Operations Administrators, and the National Executive Housekeepers Association.

Most impressive to all associated with Jim Mowatt is his concern with and compassion for his fellow workers.

Student Employment Manager Kelley Horsman keeps in close contact with students every day.

She is one of the most noticeable student advocates on campus, routinely providing help with career decisions, employment assistance for special needs students, financial difficulties, and a host of other problems.

She joined the Eastern staff in her current position in 1987, after 12 years of experience working with adults, youth and the disabled in various employment and training programs. This experience has been key to her continued success in matching students to career opportunities. Among her accomplishments:

Writing a successful grant proposal to obtain a personal computer to provide job listings to 2,000 students at the Spokane Center; designing a salary schedule for student employees when the minimum wage changed; streamlining Eastern's employment application and data change forms, resulting in 940 staff hours saved each year; increasing Eastern's off-campus placement from 280 to more than 600 students annually.

Horsman also instituted a summer job fair which introduces more than 800 students to 40 off-campus employers. She also wrote a Martin Luther King Center Grant which provided \$21,000 in additional State Work-Study funds.
