Vicksburg Aug<sup>23</sup>, 1863

Dear Father

We have orders to move on the boats immediately.

I suppose (but of course do not know) that we will land near New Orleans and go into camp to await further orders.

I am quite well to day but am weak as I have had the diarrhea two or three days, but not to day.

In the explosion of the ammunition boat here this week none of our Co. were

Vicksburg, Aug. 23, 1863.

Dear Father:
