Apr. 21, 1864.

Dear Parents:

I am here in Prison camp in excellent health and in a healthy place. I am the only officer of our Reg. Mere. There are eighteen men from the Reg. here among which are Aquilla Turner, Wm. T. Howsman, Bartlett T. Stubart and James H. Tanner of my Co., all in good health. Write to Sergt. Liggett soon as you get this, that he may know where we are.

We may be exchanged in a month or two and may not for a year so it is doubtful when you will hear from me again.

Tell Sallie to be dilligent and continue at school. I want her to go next year if she will, entirely at my expense and you will furnish her the means out of what I have sent home. Tell her she must do so. I write of it because I may have no other opportunity. Write soon. My love to all.
