It was 13 months the 28th of this month since I was captured. I was exchanged the 22th so I lacked but one day to fill the 13, You will no doubt get an account in the papers of our treatment. as prisoners of war so. New Orleans, July 26th, 1864.

Friend Evans:

Your son, who was a prisoner in Camp Ford, Tyler, Texas with myself, requested me to write to you. I am one of the prisoners lately exchanged at Red River landing but your son was not among them and is still a prisoner in Texas but when I came away was well and hearty. He was in the same mess with myself. Wheat the prospect of his early exchange is, I cannot say but I can nost assuredly say and pray that it may be soon. He has no doubt given you a little of his experience of prison life in Texas in the letter I brought through for him but his experience has not been quite so long as my own. It was 13 months the 23rd of this month since I was captured. I was exchanged the 22nd so I lacked but one day to fill the 13. You will no doubt get an account in the papers of our treatment as prisoners of war, etc. so I will not attempt it for I should come far short of doing it justice. Perhaps I will write again when I get home and have more leisure. Hoping that you will acknowledge receipt of this and write to me as soon as possible, I remain.
