## 802 STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED THIS QUARTER

### Registration Record at Beginning of Second Week Shows Gain of 147 Over Last Year

### 330 AT NORMAL FOR FIRST TIME

### 39 Are Specials Taking High School Subjects, While 18 Are Enrolled for Advanced Work

With 802 students enrolled at the beginning of the second week of the fall quarter, the registrar reports the highest attendance in the history of Cheney Normal. Of this number 330 are entering for the first time, 39 are specials taking high school subjects, while 18 are third or fourth year students.

Practically every class is crowded to capacity and in many instances new classes have been formed to provide for the overflow.

The records show a gain of 147 over the enrolment of last year.

## MANY OLD BOOKS ARE ADDED TO NORMAL LIBRARY

### Mr. Oliphant Makes Valuable Collection of Works on History of Northwest.

Due to the efforts of Mr. J. Orin Oliphant of the history department the Normal library now has a unique collection of old books pertaining to the history of the Northwest. The collection was made from book stores in Seattle, Walla Walla, Portland, and Spokane.

Among the books are two copies of the Guide Book of the Northern Pacific railroad, one published in 1883, and the other in 1888. They contain valuable descriptions of the Northwest country, and interesting material about Spokane and Cheney. A report of the commissioners during the period when John R. Rogers was governor of Washington gives the text of several important measures, including the "Barefoot School-boy" legislation, which was the germ of the present plan of school support.

Other books in the collection are: First Report of the Railway Commission, a Journal of the Senate of Washington for the session of 1895 and one for 1897, a Journal of the House of Representatives for 1899, and Messages of the Governors.

The collection also includes a History of Washington, published in 1893, a History of Northern Idaho, a Brief History of the State of Oregon, and a History of Whitman County, published in 1901.

The books in the collection pertaining to American history are two volumes of the Congressional Globe, containing the debates of congress for the session of 1860-61. This is a valuable source of material on the civil war period. Blaine's Twenty Years in Congress and Washington Irving's Life of Columbus are also included.

## Normal Teacher Becomes Bride Of Oklahoma Man

Upon her return to the Normal school the latter part of last week following her vacation, the marriage of Miss Helga Oyen, second grade critic teacher at the Normal Training School, and John Peeler of Oklahoma City, Okla., became known. The marriage occurred at Denver, August 25. Following the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Peeler spent a short honeymoon at Estes Park.

Mr. Peeler is a representative of the Favorite Stove Company and makes his headquarters in Oklahoma City. The marriage culminates a romance of ten years' duration.

### ELECTION WILL BE NEXT TUESDAY

### Each Nominee Must Have Presented Petition Signed by 25 Students

Maury Nelson, Mrs. Mildred Gellerman, and Lydia Kientzler were nominated for the position of president of the Associated Students at the regular meeting of the student body last Tuesday morning. Miss Kientzler was found to be ineligible. The election will be held next Tuesday.

Theodore Sheppard and Pauline Chandler were nominated for vice president.

### GONZAGA GAME TO OPEN SEASON

### Coach Eustis Schedules Eight Games, of Which Four Are to Be Played on Home Field

With nearly 50 men in suits and a dozen or more on the waiting list, Cheney Normal faces the greatest football season in its history.

Among the most promising material on the squad are the five returned letter men: Ted Sheppard, Blair Chenoweth, Homer Davis, James Davis, and "Babe" Laughon.

New men showing up well are Byers, tackle; Johnson, right half-back; Lawrence, center; Hilby, guard; Ashley, left half; Erickson, end; Don Chapman, tackle, and Simonton, halfback.

Although there is much more line material than backfield material, Coach Eustis hopes to pick a speedy and hard-hitting backfield from material at hand.

"Two full teams will be carried on all varsity games possible," said Coach Eustis. "However, no man need quit turning out because he can't make the first team. The second and third teams, coached by assistant Coach L. V. Tyler, will have a regular schedule of games with the high schools of the surrounding territory.

**More Than Weight Needed**

"No man who has weight alone can make the team," continued Mr. Eustis. "In fact, I look for several light men to play in the first team. In past seasons no team has been actually picked until the last of the season. The first picked team is never permanent.

"Scrimmage began on the football field last Monday. All students are invited to come, as it is not my policy to hold a closed football practice. If the students wish it, I should be glad to explain the game at several assembly periods."

## CONSTITUTION PROVIDES FOR BUDGET PLAN

Management of Finances of Normal Student Body Is Placed on Sound Business Basis

### HIGH STANDARD FOR OFFICERS

Executives Must Have Passed in 16 Hours, 10 Hours With Grade of 2 Minus (C) or Better

#### THE CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF THE STATE NORMAL SCHOOL.

##### Preamble

We, the students of the State Normal School, Cheney, Washington, in order to promote the general welfare of the school, do adopt this constitution:

**Article I**  
This organization shall be known as the Associated Students.

**Article II**  
Regular meetings of this association shall be held each Tuesday morning during the school year.

**Article III**  
To be eligible to any executive office of the Association a student must have passed in 16 hours of work and carried at least 10 hours with grades of two-minus or better in the previous quarter; and

**Clause A:** To be eligible to be elected to the office of president or chairman of any standing committee, a student must have been in residence at least three quarters; and

**Clause B:** To be eligible to be elected to the offices of vice president or secretary a student must have been in residence at least two quarters.

**Article IV**  
Sec. 1. The executive powers of this association shall be vested in the following officers: President, vice president, and secretary.

**Sec. 2.** These officers shall be nominated not later than the second Tuesday of each quarter and elected not later than the third Tuesday of each quarter, and shall hold office for the remainder of the quarter or until their successors are elected.

**Sec. 3.** It shall be the power and duty of the president:

(a) To preside over all meetings of the association;

(b) To appoint all committees as directed by the association, and such emergency committees as necessity may require.

(c) To call special meetings;

(d) To be a member ex-officio of all committees; and

(e) To perform such other duties as regularly fall to this office.

**Sec. 4.** It shall be the power and duty of the vice president to exercise the powers and duties of the president in case of the latter's absence.

**Sec. 5.** It shall be the power and duty of the secretary to keep an accurate record of all meetings of the association and to turn over to the dean of women of the institution in good shape and in well organized form at the close of his term of office all books kept by or entrusted to him during his term of office.

**Article V**  
Sec. 1. There shall be the following standing committees: Finance, social, entertainment, men's athletics, and women's athletics.

**Sec. 2.** The chairmen of these committees are to be nominated and elected at the same time and in the same manner as the other officers, as provided in Article 4, Section 2, of this constitution, and Articles 1 and 7 of By-Laws, and shall hold office for as many successive quarters as they may be in school, not to exceed four.

**Sec. 3.** Each of the above committees shall consist of four members, in addition to the chairman, two of whom shall have been in residence at least three quarters, and the other two, Juniors in residence not less than one quarter.

**Sec. 4.** These members shall be appointed at the beginning of each quarter by the president of the association and the chairman of the committee, acting in conjunction.

**Article VI**  
The duties of these committees shall be:

**Sec. 1. Finance committee:**

(a) To administer a budget for the current quarter and arrange a budget for the following quarter and present it to the advisory board for approval not later than the eighth week of the current quarter, this budget to be read at a regular meeting of the association, and published in the Journal;

(b) To examine for approval all bills for expenditures of money of the association and to present same to the accountant for payment;

(c) To keep a copy of the budget and a record of all receipts and expenditures, and to turn over the same to the accountant and dean of women at the close of each quarter.

(d) To prepare at the close of each quarter a complete and itemized financial statement and publish the same in the next issue of the Journal.

(e) At the end of chairman's term of office it shall be his duty to leave with the dean of women all records

of his office until his successor be elected.

**Sec. 2. Social committee:**

(a) To arrange and supervise all play hours;

(b) To arrange and supervise during each quarter the two informal dances and such other social functions as may be deemed advisable;

(c) To present to finance committee whenever called upon, a tentative schedule of expenditures for the coming quarter;

(d) In conjunction with the faculty members of the students' council committee to pass on invitations to the informals;

**Sec. 3. Entertainment committee:**

(a) To act in conjunction with the proper faculty committee in scheduling, supervising, managing, and directing all moving picture and lyceum entertainments and other entertainments given under the auspices of the Associated Students;

(b) To submit to the finance committee a budget for the lyceum entertainment and to turn over the net proceeds of the movie to the student loan fund.

**Sec. 4. Men's athletic committee:**

(a) To act in conjunction with the faculty committee on men's athletics in determining the athletics policy for men of the institution, formulating eligibility rules, presenting data for the athletic budget, and managing and supervising all men's athletic activities and events.

(b) The chairman of this committee shall be the student representative in the Columbia Basin Conference.

**Sec. 5. Women's athletic committee:**

a) To perform in regard to women's athletics the duties listed under Article VI, Sec. 4a.

**Article VII**  
Sec. 1. The chairmen of the committees mentioned in Article V, together with the president of the Associated Students, shall compose the advisory board.

**Sec. 2.** It shall be the duty of the advisory board, acting in conjunction with the faculty members of the students' council committee:

(a) To examine for approval the budget prepared by the finance committee;

(b) To charter or refuse to charter groups desiring to form new organizations;

(c) To formulate such alterations of school policy as may be needed from time to time.

**Article VIII**  
Sec. 1. Managers for the Journal, Kinnikinnick, debate, and students' assembly programs, and the editors-in-chief for the Journal and Kinnikinnick shall be elected from a list of nominees prepared and presented by the head of the department of language and literature or such members of the department as he shall designate.

**Sec. 2.** The above managers, with the exception of the program manager, who shall be elected at the regular election each quarter, shall hold office for as many consecutive quarters as they may be in school, not to exceed four.

**Article IX**  
Sec. 1. Each regularly enrolled student of the State Normal School shall, at the time of his enrollment each quarter, pay, in addition to such fees as may be levied by the school, a health fee of 50 cents and an Associated Student fee of \$2.50.

**Sec. 2.** No part of this latter fee of \$2.50 shall without majority vote of Associated Students be spent for any purpose other than that stipulated in the budget of the finance committee.

**Sec. 3.** This fee shall be budgeted among the following activities: Lyceum, Journal, men's athletics, women's athletics, social activities under the direction of the Associated Students, debate and oratory, and such other activities as may be authorized by the association.

**Sec. 4.** Budget data turned over to the finance committee must include both estimate of expenditures and estimate of revenue from any and all sources.

**Article X**  
To amend this constitution it will be necessary for ten (10) per cent of the student body to sign a petition requesting such amendment. The petition and the amendment shall then be discussed by the association in a regular meeting and be posted upon the bulletin board at least one week previous to the meeting at which it is to be voted upon. When accepted by two-thirds vote of the student body present, approved by two-thirds vote of the faculty present at a regular or special meeting, and signed by the president of the institution, it shall become a part of the constitution.

**Article XI**  
This constitution shall go into effect when ratified by a two-thirds vote of the student body present, a two-thirds vote of the faculty present at a regular or special meeting, and signed by the president of the institution, it shall become a part of the constitution.

**BY-LAWS**  
Article 1. All elective officers provided for in this constitution shall be elected by written ballot and the candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

**Article 2.** All amendments shall be voted upon by written ballot.

**Article 3.** All votes shall be counted immediately by a board appointed by the chairman of the day.

**Article 4.** All notices of election shall be posted upon the bulletin board by the secretary at least three days before the meeting at which such elections are to be held.

**Article 5.** Succession to office shall be in the following order: President, vice president, secretary, student chairman of the finance committee, social committee, entertain-

ment committee, men's athletic committee, and women's athletic committee.

**Article 6.** The presiding officer for the meeting at which officers are nominated and elected, shall be the president of the previous quarter, or the highest officer, in the order of succession, who is then in school.

**Article 7.** Elective officers of this association shall be nominated in the following manner:

1. Nominations shall be made and seconded from the floor of the assembly at the meeting of the association not later than the second Tuesday of each quarter.

2. The presiding officer shall at the meeting at which nominations are made, appoint a committee of three, who shall determine the eligibility of these nominees under Article III, after which the list of eligible nominees shall be posted on the bulletin board.

3. Each candidate must, before the third Tuesday of the quarter, have presented to the presiding officer in his behalf a petition signed by not less than 25 students. No person shall sign two petitions for the same office.

**Article 8.** A majority of the student body shall constitute a quorum.

## NORMAL SHOWS BIG INCREASE IN ENROLMENT

Gain in Attendance for 1923-24 Is 269 Over Previous Year, According to Report

1708 STUDENTS IN ATTENDANCE Of These 1505 Were Enrolled from Washington, 203 from Outside of State

A gain in attendance of 269 students, exclusive of those enrolled in correspondence and extension courses, is shown in the annual report of the normal school to the joint board of higher curricula, recently completed by H. N. Stronach, Normal school accountant. This report covers the period from July 1, 1923, to June 30, 1924, inclusive.

During the period covered by this report there have been enrolled 1708 students, of whom 1505 were from various counties of Washington, and 203 from other states. The annual carrying load of the institution for the year was 1,027 2-3, and the average cost per student was \$220.50. For the previous year the total enrollment was 1,439, of whom 1,246 were state students. The carrying load for 1922-23 was 945 2-3.

During the past year most of the students have been enrolled in the one and two-year elementary courses, the carrying load of these having been 900 2-3, and the cost per major student, \$221.45. The carrying load of the advanced three and four year courses was 42; the cost per major student, \$256.87. The carrying load of special students was 83 1-3, and the cost per major student, \$191.62.

The inventory value of the normal school on July 1 last, as shown by this report, was \$526,346.46. This valuation applies only to buildings and equipment. The value of the land whereon these buildings are located is not taken into consideration. The present area of the campus is about 20 acres.

The 1,505 students of Washington who attended the normal school last year came from various counties of the state as follows:

Adams, 41; Asotin, 4; Benton, 29; Chelan, 14; Clarke, 2; Columbia, 12; Douglas, 12; Ferry, 16; Franklin, 19; Garfield, 10; Grant, 26; King, 8; Klickitat, 21; Kittitas, 3; Lincoln, 126; Okanogan, 16; Pierce, 4; Pacific, 1; Pend Oreille, 20; Skagit, 1; Snohomish, 3; Spokane, 744; Stevens, 116; Walla Walla, 49; Whitman, 192; Yakima, 16.

This segregation varies but little from segregations made for rosters of previous years. Most of the students who attend the normal school come from the counties of Spokane, Whitman, Lincoln and Stevens, within a radius of 75 miles of the normal school. This is a fact which has attracted the attention of numerous students who have investigated the enrollment records of other institutions, and perhaps justifies the statement that students, as a whole, will not go very far from home to attend institutions of higher learning.

Mr. Otis W. Freeman is a new instructor in the department of geography and mathematics. Mr. Freeman received his A. B. at Albion College and his M. S. at the University of Michigan. He has studied at Northwestern University and was a member of the faculty there.

The piano department is now in charge of Miss Miriam Zimmerman. Miss Zimmerman is taking the place of Miss Margaret Paige, who is studying in New York. Miss Zimmerman comes here from Culver Stockton College, where she was head of the piano department. She has received her musical education at Washington State College and the American Conservatory of Music, Chicago. Part of her study was under Silvio Scionti, Adolf Weidig, and Louise Robyn.

Mr. Edward L. Dales of the department of science and art, after having studied last year at the University of Wisconsin, has returned to resume his duties here.

Miss Edith Patterson of the domestic art department has returned this fall after a leave of absence during the summer.

Miss Mary E. Barton, assistant librarian, who attended summer school at the University of Washington, has returned.

Mr. Robert D. Baldwin of the department of education is now studying Rural School Problems at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York.

Mr. J. Orin Oliphant has returned after having attended the University of Washington last year. Mr. Oliphant is teaching in the history department.

Dr. W. J. Wilson of the department of Language and Literature is on leave of absence for the fall quarter.

Miss Louise Spaeth, dean of women for the past three years, has been granted a year's leave of absence to take advanced work at the University of Chicago, and Mrs. Dora S. Lewis, who has been in charge of the domestic science department, has been named dean of women. Mrs. Lewis has a B. S. degree from Washington State College and has been a student at the University of Washington. Before coming to the Normal school in 1921 she was assistant in the state department of education.

Total membership of 9361 in the Washington Education Association surpasses highest previous record by nearly 25 per cent, according to Washington Education Journal. Thirty of the 75 units enrolled 100 per cent.

"Stimson Hall" is the official name of the new dormitory for men at the State College at Pullman. It was named in honor of Mr. Fred L. Stimson of Seattle, whose recent death ended a useful career on behalf of both higher education and the livestock industry in the Northwest.

The Men's Glee Club of Washington State College won first prize in a contest at Portland, Oregon, in May, in which nearly all the college and university glee clubs of the Northwest participated.

#### THE CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF THE STATE NORMAL SCHOOL.

##### Preamble

We, the students of the State Normal School, Cheney, Washington, in order to promote the general welfare of the school, do adopt this constitution:

**Article I**  
This organization shall be known as the Associated Students.

**Article II**  
Regular meetings of this association shall be held each Tuesday morning during the school year.

**Article III**  
To be eligible to any executive office of the Association a student must have passed in 16 hours of work and carried at least 10 hours with grades of two-minus or better in the previous quarter; and

**Clause A:** To be eligible to be elected to the office of president or chairman of any standing committee, a student must have been in residence at least three quarters; and

**Clause B:** To be eligible to be elected to the offices of vice president or secretary a student must have been in residence at least two quarters.

**Article IV**  
Sec. 1. The executive powers of this association shall be vested in the following officers: President, vice president, and secretary.

**Sec. 2.** These officers shall be nominated not later than the second Tuesday of each quarter and elected not later than the third Tuesday of each quarter, and shall hold office for the remainder of the quarter or until their successors are elected.

**Sec. 3.** It shall be the power and duty of the president:

(a) To preside over all meetings of the association;

(b) To appoint all committees as directed by the association, and such emergency committees as necessity may require.

(c) To call special meetings;

(d) To be a member ex-officio of all committees; and

(e) To perform such other duties as regularly fall to this office.

**Sec. 4.** It shall be the power and duty of the vice president to exercise the powers and duties of the president in case of the latter's absence.

**Sec. 5.** It shall be the power and duty of the secretary to keep an accurate record of all meetings of the association and to turn over to the dean of women of the institution in good shape and in well organized form at the close of his term of office all books kept by or entrusted to him during his term of office.

**Article V**  
Sec. 1. There shall be the following standing committees: Finance, social, entertainment, men's athletics, and women's athletics.

**Sec. 2.** The chairmen of these committees are to be nominated and elected at the same time and in the same manner as the other officers, as provided in Article 4, Section 2, of this constitution, and Articles 1 and 7 of By-Laws, and shall hold office for as many successive quarters as they may be in school, not to exceed four.

**Sec. 3.** Each of the above committees shall consist of four members, in addition to the chairman, two of whom shall have been in residence at least three quarters, and the other two, Juniors in residence not less than one quarter.

**Sec. 4.** These members shall be appointed at the beginning of each quarter by the president of the association and the chairman of the committee, acting in conjunction.

**Article VI**  
The duties of these committees shall be:

**Sec. 1. Finance committee:**

(a) To administer a budget for the current quarter and arrange a budget for the following quarter and present it to the advisory board for approval not later than the eighth week of the current quarter, this budget to be read at a regular meeting of the association, and published in the Journal;

(b) To examine for approval all bills for expenditures of money of the association and to present same to the accountant for payment;

(c) To keep a copy of the budget and a record of all receipts and expenditures, and to turn over the same to the accountant and dean of women at the close of each quarter.

(d) To prepare at the close of each quarter a complete and itemized financial statement and publish the same in the next issue of the Journal.

(e) At the end of chairman's term of office it shall be his duty to leave with the dean of women all records

of his office until his successor be elected.

**Sec. 2. Social committee:**

(a) To arrange and supervise all play hours;

(b) To arrange and supervise during each quarter the two informal dances and such other social functions as may be deemed advisable;

(c) To present to finance committee whenever called upon, a tentative schedule of expenditures for the coming quarter;
